

Ice fishing, family fun

As promised, a look at the ice fishing situation. To prove that wives are not all bad or bad all the time, or whatever, my wife invited me to go ice fishing with her. Irene also invited our two girls, Janet and Maureen, to go as well. This was fine for me as I wanted to do an article on the ways a family can enjoy this fine sport. Just to make things interesting we took a young fellow with us who had never been ice fishing before or had hardly ever been fishing, period!

We chose Gordon Thompson of Brechin as the outfit to go with as we felt he had the experience needed to assure safety and good fishing. Gord moved to this location in 1955 after an absence of a few years. He is now situated next door to where he was born. Obviously he knows the lake well as this means he has spent all his life within a few miles of Lake Simcoe.

His ice fishing business started in 1958, and has been operating ever since. Gord Thompson is situated on the second concession of Mara of Number 12 Hwy. It is easy to find as this is the second road past Beaverton. The mailing address is Box 56, Brechin, Ontario, phone 706-484-5437.

While fish, of course, are the primary fish that fishermen are interested in and these are in plentiful supply. Lake Trout are caught very often, and Herring, Smelt and Perch on occasion. Some 15 baits are available, mostly two man but there are some four-man baits for those who want them.

One thing that makes Gordon Thompson stand out from some other operators is the manner in which he maintains his

location. Gord actually goes out every Monday morning and drops a magnet down the ice holes, drawing up any object that might have been dropped down. "Anything down there will scare away the fish," Gord says, and proves this with the success rate of his operation.

On the local scene, the Credit Valley Conservation Authority had their "Come Along", regardless of the rainy

weather on Sunday. Details are available in another part of this paper. One thing I learned and decided to put here rather than in the other article is the fact that this year may prove to be the year that fishing will improve at Terra Cotta Conservation Park. As any of you know who have fished there, things slacken off after the first two weeks of the season. The ponds are stocked at the start of the fishing season and thereafter they are fished for by all manner of people. I have talked to some who make a regular trip from Toronto just for the fishing. The area can only stand so much of this pressure and the fish are consequently caught out.

However, this year the conservation authority is planning to actually store the Trout they plan to stock and put them in the ponds over a longer period of time. In this manner, the fishing will be good as long as the stock in the holding pond is maintained. If the demand is heavy, possibly they can obtain more stock from the ministry of natural resources or some of the private hatcheries. Last year the stocks of Trout in the province were at a high demand level and consequently were almost impossible to obtain. We hope the CVCA will harken to the needs of those of us who patronize the park for the purpose of fishing and for nothing much more than that. Do we not deserve our money's worth from what we invest in the gate fees?

Mind you I am not saying that all fishermen must get fish or not enjoy the conservation authority properties. I for one get a lot of enjoyment from the many aspects of the park and make a habit of taking many of my friends and guests to the area for its beauty. However, when I go fishing and can't afford the time or money to travel, I would like to get a few fish. Your written comments on this would be appreciated and would be forwarded on to the authority.
