# Ontario Hockey Association, 1 - Raiders, 0

At a specially called Ontario Hockey Association tribunal held last Thursday night, the Georgetown Chrysler Raiders were officially suspended from the OHA Intermediate "A" League, for the remainder of this bockey season. This effectively kills any hopes the Raiders had entertained of making another charge at the Hardy Cup.

There is a posibility, however, that the Raiders might be subject to even stronger disciplinary action when the OHA executive meets this coming Wednesday. A member of the OHA head office informed The Herald that the Raiders' case is defintely on the agenda and, if the violation of league rules is considered flagrant enough, the suspension could be extended for more than this year.

As has been stated previously, Port Colborne Sailors originally protested the status of Raiders' Jerry Pearson. A league protest meeting agreed with the Sailors' claim but merely ordered the Raiders to change the player's status. This was not

enough for Port Colborne, who announced plans to lodge an appeal against the decision.

A majority of the teams in the OHA In-termediate "A" league voted to await the outcome of the appeal and playoff plans were shelved. The Port Colborne action had no precedent and a special OHA tribunal was set up to deal wit the problem. In the interim, Port Colborne came up with new and more damaging evidence against the Raiders and it was this new material which caused the tribunal to waive the protest meetings' decision and issue the suspension.

The new evidence proved that the Raiders had submitted false information to the OHA. Again, this was verified by a source in the OHA head office. The Appeal Tribunal's findings will be forwarded to the OHA executive and it will be up to them to make final judgement. In light of the suspension and the curtailing of the Raiders' season, the club issued the following statement.

"On Thursday, Feb. 27, 1975 the OHA held an appeal tribunal to reconsider the results of the protest hearing held on Wednesday, Feb.

19, 1975 in Toronto. The appeal tribunal found the Georgetown Intermediate Hockey Club guilty of falsifying the information regarding the player in question. The club was fined \$25.00, stripped of points earned against the Port Colborne team, and barred from further competition this playing year.

"The tribunal panel consisted of Russ Prouse (a Brampton lawyer) as chairman and spokesman, Hugh McLean (OHA first vice-president) and Bud Miller (OHA league convenor). The panel felt that the Georgetown club should become an example for all OHA teams and that the OHA would not tolerate any player card irregularities.

The OHA rule manual number 203 states, Any team club or team official or player found guilty of allowing false information to appear on a registration certificate or who knowlingly makes false representation to the Association, shall be suspended for a period to be determined by the Executive Committee. Further, the offending team shall forfeit to the non-offending team all previously played games in which the name of the offending official or player appears on

the game report. The points for all such games will be awarded to the non-offending

severe ruling we faced would be: 1. The player involved could be suspended: 2. The president-manager could be summended: 3. Any Executive or club member who could be identified as being involved could be suspended.

'The duration of these suspensions would be at the discretion of the OHA President. "The Raiders' executive is both shocked and disappointed at the severity of the penalty imposed. Two years ago the Dundas Intermediate Hockey Chib was found gulity

five players involved were suspended. We feel that we have been penalized out of all reasonable proportion to the offence and past penalties. The Raiders Hockey Club has received overwhelming degree of support from our fans, and the businesamen who have sponsored our team and it's activities. To these people and the players and their families we apologize for the premature conclusion of our season. The hopes and ef-

forts of hundreds of people were channelled into the effort to win the Hardy Cup

"The Raiders will be back next season and we will endeavour to give our fans a high degree of competition and a longer season

If a league is to survive, it's members must abide by the rules and regulations as set down. The Raiders violated the league rules and the only question that remains is, was the penalty too harsh? Obviously the other teams in the league were hoping for just such a ruling. It should also be noted, that at the meeting in Thorold a short while ago, Fort Erie and Thorold, although voting along with Georgetown, expressed displeasure at cer-tain questionable Raiders' tactics. Dundas volced the opinion that unless the Raiders were dealt with firmly, the league might lose its credibility.

So who is to blame for this unfortunate

happening which has deprived Georgetown of Intermediate Hockey at least for the balance of this season? Port Colborne, who lodged the appeal? The OHA for handling down the ruling? Possibly the player who got caught in the middle? I don't feel any of the above can honestly be called to task.

The responsibility must lie with the Raiders' Executive. Somewhere along the line, someone made the decision to by-pass the rules and by doing so undermined the league. This, I am sure, is the position that the OHA took and thus the reason for the severity of the ruling. Perhaps the league will be better off because of this decision; Perhaps the Raiders will be. Only time will

For Raiders' fans It is a bitter pill to swallow because of the team's potential as a possible Hardy Cup winner. But then again, there is more time to prepare for next season and more time to think about ways to avoid the mistakes that were made this year.
