# GDHS gymnasts dominate East

The East Halton gymnastic championships were held last Thursday at White Oaks Secondary School in Oakville and, to the delight of coaches Joyce Finley and Sheila White, the Georgetown and District High School gymnasts dominated the meet.

The GDHS team was first in team totals, compiling 233.29 points to T.A. Skellock's 212.53 and Oakville-Trafalgar's 205.21. The GDHS team won the Intermediate and Senior sections of the meet and placed third in the Junior section.

information to the OHA regarding Jerry Pearson." The Raiders indiscretions this year could also effect the OHA's decision to allow a Junior "B" team in Georgetown for next season. As it happens, the people applying, as an executive, to the OHA for a Junior "B" team in Georgetown are the same people who were involved with the Raiders. If the OHA decides that further disciplinary action against the Raider's executive is necessary, then the Junior "B" team would be left without a management committee.
