# Speak out on town's hunting bylaw now!

Now is the time to speak out in favor of sensible license controls for hunting in Halton Hills. Clerk Doug Pritchard stated recently "I'd hate to see 200 hunters in one square mile all shooting at each other" unquote. Statements like this do nothing but harm to those of us who take our hunting seriously and sensibly. NOW is the time to write to the clerk of the town of Halton Hills and let him know your feelings and ideas on the subject. We should have a part in drafting by-laws.

Probably never more than two hunters at one time are ever in one square mile of territory anyway. And they would not be shooting at each other.

While on the subject of the town, I, for one, hope they get the land they want on the creek through town. I have seen the old photographs of the area when the reservoir was filled behind the Co-Op and it was a centre of much activity for the town's people. It could be again, if things go well.

While you have pen in hand, why not write to the Credit Valley Conservation Authority and ask the chairman of the Wildlife Advisory Board if there are any plans to effect better hunting in the region under their control? The name to contact is Harold Darraugh, chairman of that board or the vice-chairman, Charles Bryan, CVCA, Meadowdale, Ont. L0J 1K0

Believe it or not, some have taken great pleasure in fishing at Stewarttown two weeks ago for Speckled Trout. The season is closed and I will report anyone I find fishing or have evidence enough for a conviction, to the authorities. The same applies to those young fellows that are using equipment in the valley known as Hunny Hollow, or Cedarvale. The season is closed and also there is no hunting allowed in this area.

Bill 5-14 is now before the Senate. This applies to

the Criminal Code, more specifically to weapons. This would make all hunting arms restricted weapons, or "a weapon of any kind that is declared by order of the governor in council to be a restricted weapon." I am sure that a copy may be obtained by writing to The Senate of Canada, The Honorable Senator Cameron, Bill 5-14, in care of your member of parliament. It could be extremely important to the future of hunting regarding the right to own a hunting firearm.

Those who are members of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters will have this bill in the bulletin for January-February. The "Anti-Gun" folks are getting in their say; are we?

As I have mentioned several times, planning is a very important part of any trip. This is especially true of fishing. There are seasons, and weather conditions to consider. As an example, last year I went with a fishing partner to the area back of Algonquin Park. We figured the lakes would be free of ice by the time we planned to be there in the spring. Every lake in the region was open except the one we intended to fish. This one was just beginning to break, with narrow cracks around the exit stream end of the lake. However there was not enough open water to fish in and the ice, of course, was rotten, and unsafe. If we had had a little forethought we would have realized that this lake was in a sheltered valley and did not receive the warming winds and the same amount of sun as the lakes in the surrounding area. Consider all these things when planning your trips and you will be less likely to have disappointment.

Next week I will give you some information pertaining to early season fishing and how to fish for those first fish of the year. The primary fish will be Walleye, and they can be the best fishing of the year if fished for in the right way.

# Let's cheer our bowlers on

Over 600 Youth Bowlers from across southern Ontario will converge on Scarborough this Sunday, March 16 to compete in the YBC Provincial Championships. Among them, representing Georgetown Bowl and Zone "F" (Central Ontario) will be a total of 16 local bowlers.

The Provincial Championships are the third step in the Youth Bowling Council's "Four Steps to Stardom" Championships. All competitors at this level are hoping to clinch one of the six teams or six singles titles in order to earn the right to represent Southern Ontario at the National Youth Bowling Championships in Calgary, Alberta next April. Competitors at the Provincial level were decided at rollofs held in each of the 17 "zones" in Southern Ontario. There are 12 events (teams and singles) with three age classifications: Bantams - under 12 years, Juniors 12 to 14 years; and Seniors - 15 to 19 years.

Georgetown Bowl is to be represented in four events. The Bantam Girls Team, made up by Lisa Burke, Julie Burns, Debbie Scarborough, Cathy Coburn and Robin Richardson, is coached by Mrs. Joan Richardson. They bowl at April Lanes at 1.30 p.m.

The Senior Girls Team members are Pat Syme, Sylvia Heisler, Ruth Finlay, Wendy Boukhill and Deenie Bratkin. Their coach is Mrs. Charlene McCormack. Yvonne Bratkin is bowling in the Senior Girls Singles event. Both team and singles start at 1.30 p.m. in Ace Bowl.

The Senior Boys Team consists of Steve Burns, Steve Foster, Gary Richardson, Mark Reis and Rick Gourlie. They are coached by George Barber. This team also rolls off at Ace Bowl but their starting time is 11 a.m.

Opening ceremonies are at 10.30 a.m. in all houses. The Victory Banquet, where award presentations will be made to the top three finishers in each event, is to be held at 5 p.m. Presiding over the championships is Mrs. Rose Radyk, YBC Provincial Chairman and co-proprietor of Georgetown Bowl.

Since 1968, Georgetown Bowl has sent 28 representatives to the National Championships through the Provincials. In the past, our bowlers have always been supported well by good crowds, and this year they would appreciate the same. Anyone interested in cheering for our bowlers at this event is quite welcome to come along and do so. Directions to the Scarborough bowling centres may be obtained at Georgetown Bowl, where they are posted. Good luck to everyone.
