Coaches Corner Team play



BILL HAWKINS feels that for a team to be a winner, team play must be stressed.
Bill Hawkins has been involved with the Georgetown and District Minor Hockey Association for the past six years. The family, Bill's wife Margaret and their two sons, Gerald and Ronald, have moved in Georgetown for the past ten years. Prior to moving to Georgetown the family spent some time in Hamilton. However, Bill was born and raised in Truro, Nova Scotia. It was there that he picked up most of his hockey experience, apart from his years in Georgetown hockey. He was a goaltender for the Truro majors and at one time was invited to the Toronto Marlboros camp.
Bill, in his six years coaching Georgetown boys, has always handled the same team. Playing in the Bantam division, the team is called Fred's Auto Body, but was known as St. Louis under the old Little NHL system. Bill has guided his team to the finals twice and his team participated in what has been called one of the best minor hockey games seen in Georgetown for years and years.
Bill's team was involved in the finals against New York, coached by Bill Richmond. The game wasn't decided until the third overtime period, when New York won 3-2. Many spectators thought it was too bad that both teams couldn't be declared winners as the lads of both teams played their hearts out.
Bill's advice this week is directed mainly at house league players, but from this writer's point of view, could easily relate to all hockey players, regardless of their age or league affiliation. Bill believes, especially in house league play, that team play must be stressed.
There is no real need for individual stars at this level. Don't be a hog, skating all over the ice. Play your position and your chance will come. If you don't play your position, your team could lose some excellent scoring opportunities and the opposition could greatly benefit by your wandering aimlessly around.
You should be willing to pass the puck if you see a teammate has a better opening than you. Bill notes that he goes out of his way to congratulate the boy or boys who assisted on a scoring play. The fellow who sets up a goal is just as important, or maybe even more important, than the fellow who actually gets the goal. This is a good practice to get into. Should a teammate get a goal, don't forget when it's time to hand out the pats on the back, to give the player or players who assisted some praise. In the long run it will bring your team closer together.
As Bill notes in closing, "The team that plays as a team rather than as a group of individuals will win more games and eventually enjoy the game more."
