

Rise in March building permits

The winter slump in building in Halton Hills picked up slightly in March according to figures released by the town's building department on the number of building permits issued in March.

A total of 22 permits were issued in March for a total of \$331,547 worth of building. That almost doubles the number of permits issued to date although the values of the buildings to the end of March was much higher in the first two months

than March. The total value of construction carried out in the first three months of this year was \$1,244,367.

The largest number of construction projects in March consisted of alterations. Ten permits were issued for building projects valued at \$46,375. Two permits were issued for swimming pool installations valued at \$6,200 while two permits for garages or carports, valued at \$4,000 were issued.

Five building permits for single family dwellings were issued. The value of the five homes was listed at \$213,500. To the end of March construction had begun on nine new single family dwellings in Halton Hills valued at \$338,500.

Professional director for new GLT play

Georgetown Little Theatre's latest production "The Miracle Worker" looks to be the most dramatic presentation of recent years as the story of Helen Keller is enacted by the Georgetown players.

A grant from Theatre Canada made it possible for GLT to acquire a professional director for its last play of the season. Fred Thury was selected by the group because of the successful theatre workshop he conducted in Georgetown last year. Mr. Thury selected the play and has modified the script to make it possible to produce the play within the limited facilities of Howard Wrigglesworth auditorium.

The starring roles of the play, Helen Keller and Annie Sullivan, teacher to the deaf-mute are played by Amanda Roxborough and Sue Dunning.

Rehearsals have begun for the three-act play, with Pat Joyce as assistant director and Joanne Lupton as producer. The 16-member cast plus the off-stage voices, represents one of the largest casts to appear on the Wrigglesworth Stage.

Some interesting effects will be used since the stage area is small, according to the director Mr. Thury. One area of the stage will be in complete darkness as a set change takes place and the actors will then walk from one scene to another.

The small stage area and the limited lighting will make producing the play a challenge to all concerned with the production.

Plowmen explain how it's done Halton lends Durham a hand

On Tuesday, March 25 Halton Plowmen travelled to Whitby to meet with the 1975 International Plowing Match and World Plowing Contest committees. From September 23 to

28, 1975 these important events will be taking place just north of Highway 7 at Brooklin.

The Cairn of Peace to commemorate the World Contest will be erected in this location, with the unveiling to take place on opening day, September 23, so that the cairn will be on view for the many visitors to see during the week of the match. Dedication of the cairn will take place at a divine service on the afternoon of Sunday, September 23, following which the cairn will be accepted by the region of Durham for keeping and maintaining in perpetuity.

This is the first time that the International Plowing Match has extended to six days, and this will also be the first time that Tent City will be open to the public on a Sunday. This is being done because of the proximity to a large urban population, with the feeling that many will take the opportunity to visit the match on their day off.

Up to 26 channels

Extra channels for Glen

Residents of Glen Williams will be the first to be part of the re-building program that will eventually permit the use of extra channels provided by Halton Cable Systems.

Replacing of amplifiers and cable has already begun in the village with the old equipment being transferred to sites in

Georgetown. "The equipment we are taking out of the Glen is the newest that was installed in the old system two years ago," said Mr. Jamieson president of Halton Cable Systems.

New lines have been installed on King Street to feed the Glen in preparation for the

changeover that will feed Georgetown, Acton, Milton, Norval and Glen Williams from the new tower located at Speyside.

"The processing and receiving equipment is already installed in the new head-end at Speyside," added Mr. Jamieson. It is hoped that by the end of April, Acton will be in service from the Speyside location.

The new system implemented in Georgetown will provide up to 26 channels through the use of a set top converter. These converters will be available for lease for an extra \$2.50 per month or can be purchased from Halton Cable Systems for \$39.00.

The converters will connect directly to the set and provide remote control switching of all the channels.
