New number for hospital patient calls

Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital has a new phone number.

The new number is 877-0111. In order to expand the telephone system it was necessary to replace the system completely with a new switchboard and new number.

Now patients' phones are available in all the wards with one phone for each two patients. At the request of the administration, incoming patient calls are asked to be made after 8:00 a.m. and no later than 9 p.m. The switchboard will direct all calls to

the proper rooms. The incoming call capacity has been doubled to handle the patients' phones plus the new wing of the hospital. At present there are 70 locals operating within the hospital.

Bell Canada will intercept calls to the old phone number and advise callers on the new number until the new directory is published, in February.

"The system we have installed will be expandable to handle present and future needs of the hospital," said Brian Pollock, business manager of the hospital.

Skaters want tax cuts

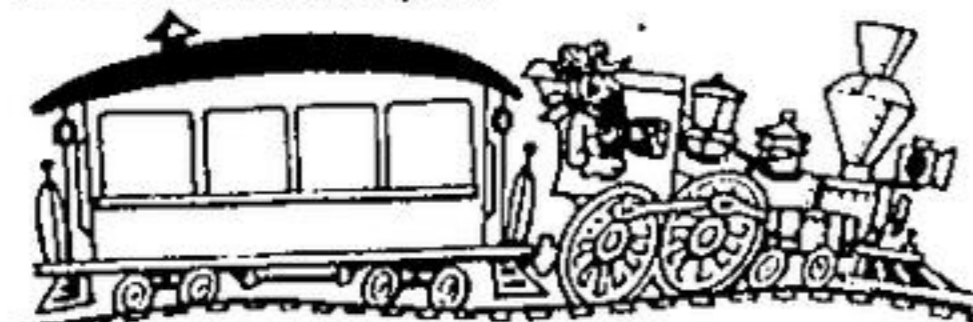
