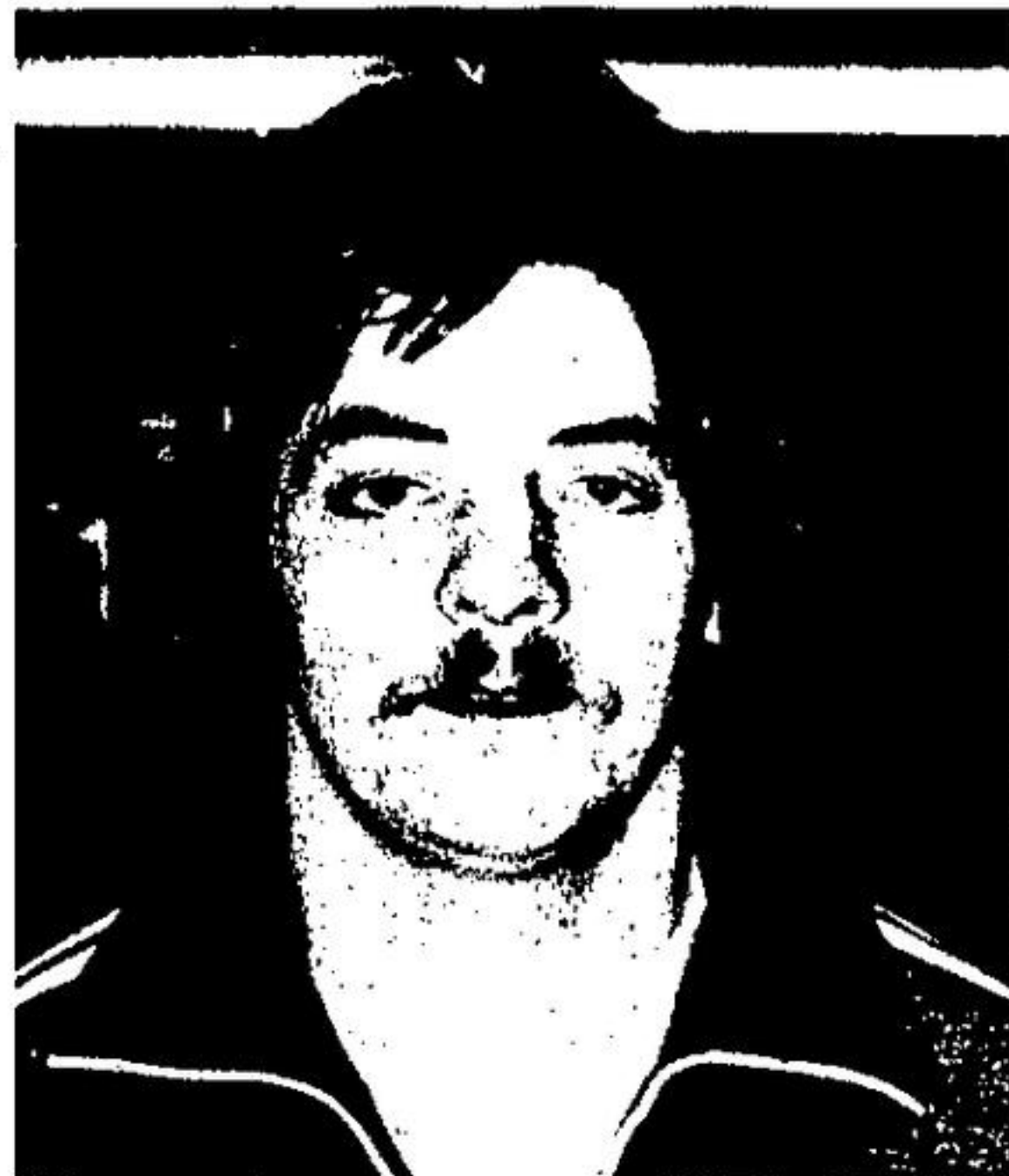

The Rams previously had their base of operations in Acton but this year have shifted to Georgetown.

Robert Pool is married and works as a junior accountant for a Mississauga firm. He began playing lacrosse at the age of six in the Long Branch Minor Lacrosse system. He competed throughout the minor system there and was last active with the Etobicoke Junior "A" PCO's.

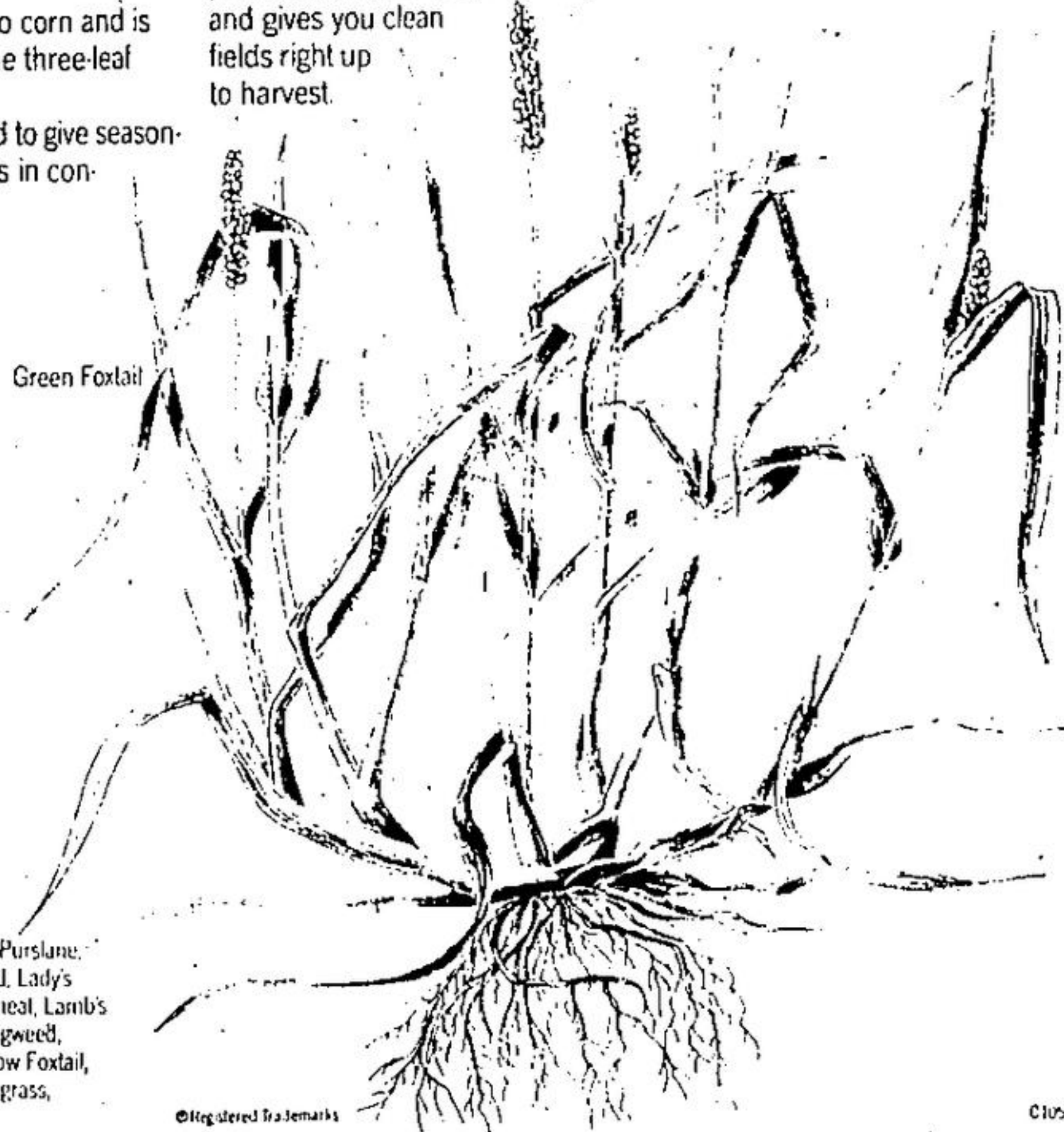
