The group had been discussing the possibility of an OHA Junior "B" chub in Georgetown for a little over a year. It was just in the last three months however that serious preparations took place.

Doug Coulbeck stated that they had talked to George Ferguson, convenor of the Central Ontario Junior "B" league-the league which Georgetown could join- and that, from the assurances they received from Ferguson, their application has been accepted in principle. All that remains is for the OHA to formally accept the application. It is expected that this will be done at the OHA meeting scheduled for May 2.

The gentleman involved with the formation of the team had worked together previously on the executive of Georgetown's Junior "C" team which ceased operation after the 1968-69 season. They wished to make clear that they are completely seperate from the Intermediate "A" situation, Mr. Coulbeck commented that the group was not formed to take over the Intermediate "A" club and further, their actions in applying for a Junior "B" club should not be construed as an attempt to undermine in any way, the operation of an Intermediate "A" hockey team in Georgetown.

Should the application be accepted, Georgetown would join the Central Ontario

Junior "B" league which is made up of teams from Oakville, Burlington, Milton, Streetsville, Brampton, Dixie, Thornhill, and Royal York (Etobicoke). There is a possibility that Burlington may go elsewhere but this would have no real bearing on the actual running of the league.

The operating of a Junior "B" team would cost roughly between \$20,000 and \$25,000 a year and for this reason, Mr. Coulbeck, speaking on behalf of the group expressed the hope that the people of Georgetown would rally behind the team.

According to Mr. Coulbeck, the fledgling team has already set certain goals for itself and will attempt to adhere to them as closely as possible. The club will be built on local talent, run by local people and funded by local money. It was also stated that in conversations with local minor hockey people, an understanding was reached, whereby the Junior "B" team would work in complete harmony with the local minor hockey group.

A Junior "B" chib can work in Georgetown. All that is really needed is local support. This paper would like to be one of the first to offer the team the best of luck in their endeavour.
