

# GDHS track team



ROSS JEFFERY of the GDHS Track and Field team hits the tape as the winner in the Midget boys 100-metre dash at the track meet held at Sheridan College last week. It was quite a day for Ross as he also won the 200- and 400-metre sprints.

The Track and Field season for high schools is one of the shortest, time-wise, in terms of actual competitions, of any of the various sporting activities available to young athletes. Training begins months in advance yet the season lasts approximately a month so, it's a do-or-die situation for the athletes involved once the meets get rolling.

This past week, the GDHS Track and Field teams were involved in two meets; a meet convened by Milton High School at Sheridan College on Tuesday and the annual Blue and Gold Relays at Port Credit High School in Mississauga, on Saturday.

At the Milton convened meet, much to the surprise and delight of their coaches, the GDHS athletes finished a strong second to White Oaks High School of Oakville. The team as a whole, however, did not do as well as expected in the Blue and Gold Relays. But some outstanding individual performances were turned in. It should be noted that the Blue and Gold Relays attracted

over 20 schools, from throughout the southern area with teams from Toronto through to Burlington competing.

In the girls division on Tuesday, Doris Tichel picked up firsts in the Midget 100- and 200-metre events; Cathy Masson raced to firsts in the Junior 100- and 200-metre sprints; Sue Alexander placed second in both the Junior 100- and 200-metre sprints. Jennie Thompson led the pack in the Midget 800- and 1500- metre races.

Cathy Clark won double honors in the Junior 800- and 1500-metre events; Marg Oliver was first in the Senior 1500-metre race; Laura Simpson picked up top spot in the Junior shot putt and Marianne Nemeth placed second in the Junior 800-metre event.

For the boys, their day was highlighted by the performances of Ross Jeffery and Mike Dixon. Ross picked up three firsts in the Midget sprints, in the 100-, 200- and 400-metre events and Mike Dixon blew the rest of the field off the track in the 3,000-metre

event smashing the old Halton record by an amazing 20 seconds. John Clark placed first in the Junior 800-metre race with Mike Morette placing third in the same event.

Ted Kewley picked up a second in the Senior 800-metre run; Dave Avery was second in the Midget 1500-metre race; Norm Ibuki leaped to a first in the Midget long jump and a second in the triple jump; Bruce McIntyre led the field in the Midget 3,000-metre run; Paul Allison placed second in the Junior long jump.

Peter Hurley's toss in the Senior shot putt was good enough for top spot; Mike Stankovits placed second in the Senior discus and Jamie Frank displayed his courage in his teammates when he finished fourth in the Midget 1500 metres, then, an hour later, thrilled his mates with his finish in the 3,000-metre run. All told, the GDHS crew picked up 16 firsts, nine seconds and nine thirds in the Milton convened meet.

In the Blue and Gold Relays, Ross Jeffery was fourth in the Midget 200 metre sprint; Alex

Otto placed sixth in the 1,500 metre Midget run; Norm Ibuki was sixth in the Midget triple jump and Art Wheeler picked up a third in the Midget Javelin.

Bruce McIntyre and Alex Otto although Midgets, ran in the Open 3,000-metre event. Bruce broke the Halton Midget record by five seconds, while Alex also turned in a very respectable performance, placing third in his section and sixth overall. Mike Morette ran a strong race in the 800 metre event. The Midget relay team, made up of Jon Williamson, Larry Davis, John Wright, and Ross Jeffery ran together for the first time and turned in a very respectable 51.0 seconds for their 400-metre event.

This weekend, the team will be split up, with the Midgets competing in a meet at McMaster University in Hamilton and the Junior and Seniors travelling to Waterloo. The Halton championships are set for May 13, the Peel-Halton for May 22 and, depending on performances, the All-Ontario are scheduled for June 6 and 7.

## The Trout are biting

Stream Trout catch is up. As the water warmed this past week the Trout started to hit a little better. Worms, however, are still the best bait to use, although lures do account for some, and will continue to do so and increase as the days go by. Orangeville reservoir has seen some good catches of Rainbows lately, and Terra Cotta park has given up some good specs again.

The huge Rainbow Trout that are known to be in the ponds at Terra Cotta conservation area, are holdovers from previous plantings and are hard to get at, and even harder to catch. They are worth the effort though.

Rainbows are still in a spawning state in the Georgian Bay watershed, with fish in the following rivers; Pretty, Bighead, Mad, Silver, Coldwater, as well as the Souble, Wilnot, Ganaraska, and the Shelter Valley Creek. The last ones being in other parts of the province of course.

Smelt are running and are being taken in Burlington, Bronte, Port Credit and Oakville to name a few. They are also starting in the Parry Sound area and Lake Simcoe tributaries. These areas should be peaking today (Wednesday) as well as the Magnetawan, and the Keefer Creek at Owen Sound. Smelt fishing is a social as well as sporting trip. The atmosphere is almost carnival, as the crowds gather and fires are started, and the lights are switched on for checking the nets. Remember there are rules and laws for smelt fishing and these are in the Ontario Fishing Regulations.

One thing that always upsets me, as well as a great many others, is the way people throw the shad that are caught on the banks and piers. Not only are they unsightly, smelly and a waste, these are the fish that the Rainbow Trout and Salmon of Lake Ontario feed on, in order to attain their great size. When they are thrown on the banks,



it is that much less for the game fish to feed on. Why not pick the smelt out of the nets and leave the shad??? As you put the net back in the water they will swim out, VOILA! no bother to anyone. Lets show people we care in all aspects of OUR outdoors.

Some Walleye are still running, and, according to the last word I got from the ministry of natural resources, the season opened on the third of May. The regular season open on May 10, so be sure to check it out before fishing. The Walleye is open in the Prince Edward Island and St. Lawrence River areas as of May 3, but they are seasons open to afford opportunity for fishermen to get out after this prize game fish.

The second round in the battle of the sea lamprey is going into effect in the next few days if it has not already started. Lampicide will be put in Duffins Creek. It is applied every four years to get at the larvae that stay in the mud of the stream for as long as four to five years. Complete eradication of the lamprey is not expected, but to get them to a level of control.

Here is a tip that should never be forgotten, ever. Always fish in the shade! Whether on the shady side of a lake or river, or in the shade of a stump or rock, that is where the fish are. Unlike people, fish do not have a retina in the eye nor do they have an eyelid, therefore they cannot squint or close their eyes to the brightness of the sun. For them, light is pure agony.

Of course in the early morning and late afternoon, the sun's rays are at a slant and will not be as strong due to the refraction of the rays, and fish will start to come out to feed. Try it and see if I am right, before you scoff.

Another thing that's proven true by yours truly, are the Solunar Tables. I never thought too much about them either, 'til I checked the times that fish were caught to the times given in the charts. They proved to be close enough that they could not be discounted. For this weekend the times to fish are: Saturday 4.30 a.m. minor feeding, 11 a.m. major feeding, 5 p.m. minor time and 11.30 p.m. major period. Try it and see. Then call me and let me know the results of your tests. After all, experimentation is the best way I know of to improve your knowledge of ONTARIO OUTDOORS.

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
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
