In perhaps the best game of the year for the Halton County Men's Basketball Association, the Warriors defeated the Cougars 43-42 last Thursday night to take both the championship series two games to one and the league crown.

The Warriors won the first game of the final series handily but the Cougar rallied to tie the series and set the stage

for Thursday's crucial rubber match.

In the championship game, the Cougars jumped in front early, at one point taking a six-point lead. The Warriors failed to panic and chipped away at the Cougars lead and, by half-time, held a one-point advantage, 19-18. Both teams were stressing defence and the lead changed hands several

times throughout the second half.

As the final minutes ticked away, the game was still up for grabs but Jim Costigan's basket with 20 seconds showing on the game clock spelled the difference and gave the Cougars their 43-42 championship win.

Costigan led the Warriors scores with 16 points. Rob

Phillips had nine, Bill Blingham added eight, while Doug Getty and Gord Bassett each contributed four points.

For the Cougars in their losing effort, Don Hurley netted 13 points, Fred Harris counted 12, Brian Cosgrove hooped seven, Jim Ridley had six and Steve Frost and Dave Boycott hit for two points respectively.

Argos trounce Rebels

The Optimists Club of Georgetown sponsored an exhibition basketball game between the GDHS Rebels and a team composed of Toronto Argonauts football players last Friday evening at the GDHS gym. The Argonaut contingent was led by team quarterback Mike Rae, and included Cor Doret, Paul Krause, Morris Zubkwich and Wayne Allison. Their opponents from GDHS included various members of this past week's Junior and Senior basketball Rebels.

The fans who attended the contest were treated to a fine basketball game, with the pass, run and kick boys displaying their athletic ability coming away with an 83-61 win.

Mike Rae, the gridiron leader, played the same role on the hardwood floor and hit for 34 points as the game's high scorer. Cor Doret, taking advantage of open lanes to the basket, hit for 21 points, most

of them on lay-ups. Paul Nichol had 14 points for the Rebels with Mark Reis adding 10.

The teams were evenly matched in the opening quarter and the Argos led 20-19. The impression given was that the Scullers were merely feeling out their opposition and testing for flaws.

Paul Krause, displaying a beautiful jump shot hit for 11 points in the opening team minutes. His deadly outside shooting opened up the area under the basket and it was mostly on driving lay-ups that the Argos built up their 42-29 half-time lead. At half-time, Mike Rae led all scorers with 18 points, Paul Nichol had eight for the Rebels.

The second half had Rebs' coach, Jim Costigan substituting freely and the Argos built up an insurmountable 60-39, three-period lead. In the fourth frame the Argos coasted but when pressed,

picked up the pace and scored at will.

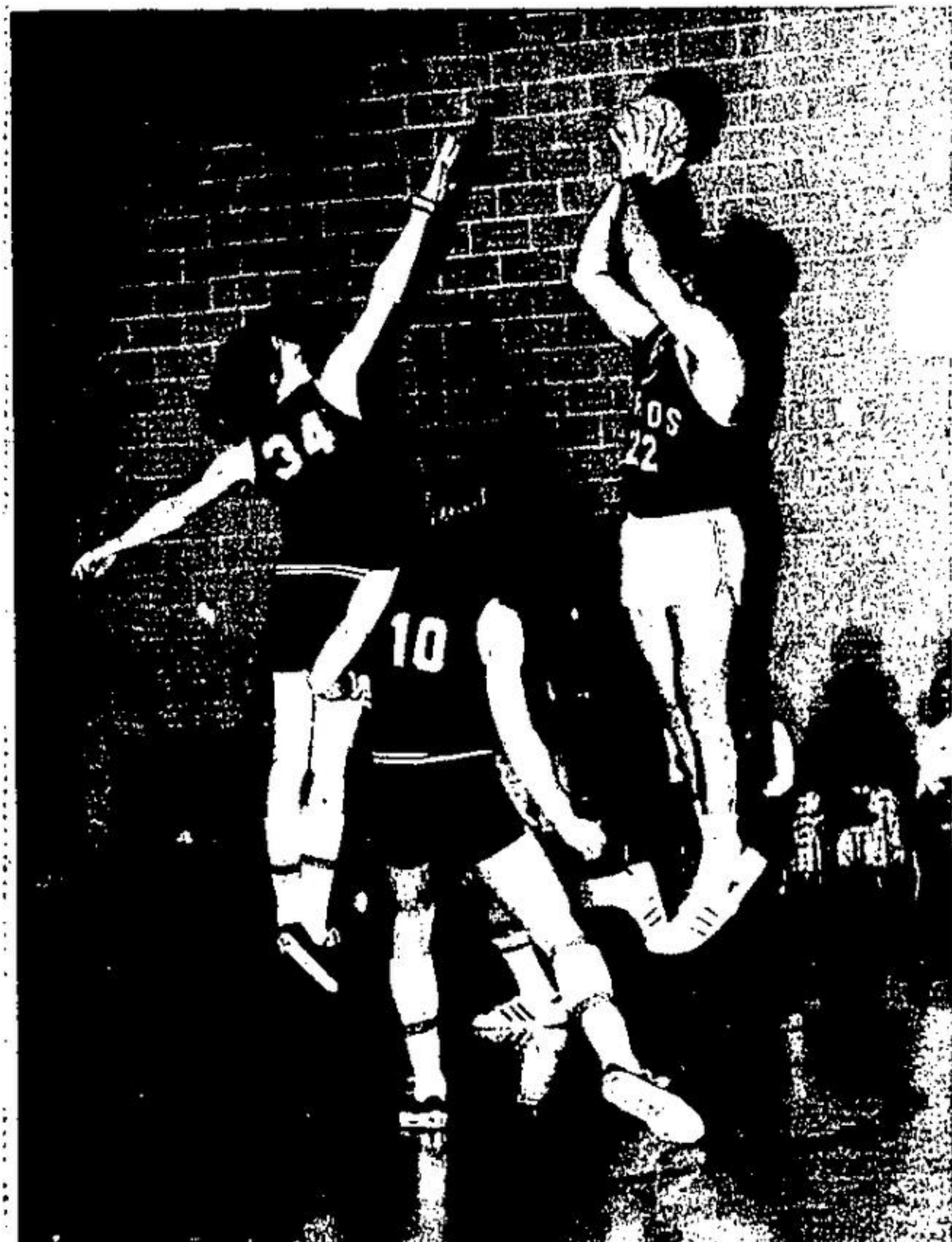
All the Argos were impressive in a game that requires a different ability from the footballers' usual realm. Those in attendance

Poor White Oaks tactics

Rough start for Rebels

The Georgetown District High School Senior and Junior soccer Rebels opened their season this past week. The Senior Rebels won a bitterly contested match, 1-0 over White Oaks High School of Oakville, while the Juniors played twice, losing to White Oaks Juniors 2-0 on Tuesday, then claiming a 3-2 decision over Oakville-Trafalgar

Juniors on Thursday. All three matches were played at Georgetown District High School.

In the Senior game, several fights broke out to mar the match and hacking and vicious tackling seemed a part of the White Oaks team's tactics. The Georgetown Seniors did not exhibit a good brand of soccer but coach Tom Beer expressed

the belief that the attitude of the White Oaks players did not allow his team to concentrate on merely playing good soccer. Tom Koch scored the Georgetown counter and it proved to be the winning margin.

The Juniors swung into action on Tuesday, coach Jack Brown blamed the defeat on

the lack of exhibition game experience. He had not had a chance to view his players under actual game conditions prior to Tuesday's contest and he openly admitted that some of his boys were badly positioned.

Thursday's game was a different story however, as the Juniors exhibited a confidence that was lacking on Tuesday and moved the ball better for a total team win. Coach Brown had moved some of his players to other positions for Thursday's game and the club exhibited much better balance. The Rebels, despite the closeness of the score, dominated Thursday's game, with Todd Beckett notching all three of his team's counters. Beckett was an important cog in the Junior machine last year and, from his performance on Thursday he seems determined that the trend will continue this year.

The Senior and Junior Rebels were scheduled to play at home on Tuesday, however, at press time the scores were not available.

Penalties prove Rams' downfall

In a surprisingly rough game for so early in the season, the Oakville Clippers defeated the Halton Hills Rams 16-15 in lacrosse action at the Georgetown Arena last Thursday evening. This was the second exhibition encounter between these two teams in a little over a week and perhaps, in this instance, familiarity does indeed breed contempt.

According to Howard Dwyer, Rams' manager, the team took far too many foolish penalties and this resulted in the loss. The Rams accumulated 80 minutes in penalties and the Clippers were not far behind as their total fell just two minors short of matching the local team's sin bin time.

The Rams held a slim, 5-4 lead after the first period but fell behind 12-10 after 40 minutes of play. Ian Duff, not noted as a scorer last year, popped three goals in the opening frame. Glen Sherman also came up

with a hat trick for the Rams. Steve Wison, Paul Wilson and Andy Broadbent notched two goals apiece for the locals, while singles went to Bruce Cooksley, Bruce Green and Bill Fox.

Broadbent is one of the few Georgetown boys to try out for the team and his play impressed the team management. Twenty-one players were dressed for the game however the roster has not yet been finalized. This week's practices will determine the final cuts and competition for places on the team has been keen.

The Rams will work out at the Georgetown arena on Wednesday (tonight) at 8:30 and on Thursday at 7:30.

The season's regular schedule is still in the process of being finalized but the Rams travel to Orillia May 12 for their season's opener. They begin their home stand in Georgetown Tuesday, May 15. Game time for all matches is 8:30.
