Smelt down

Smelt fishing has not been as good as was expected in the Lake Ontario regions. It got off to a slow start and did not turn up the quantities of Smelt that were caught in other years. However, this week could show me wrong on this as the fish might come in yet.

Some fishermen already know that the Coho Salmon follow the Smelt and Alewife in close to shore as these small fish come up the rivers to spawn in the springtime. With this in mind many are trolling the mouth of the big rivers where the Smelt runs occur, in the hopes of catching one of these fighting game fish. The Coho can then be caught near the surface on lures that resemble the Alewife or Smelt, and trolled just under the surface, with an eye peeled for signs of schools of baitfish being chased to the surface by foraging Salmon, or even Rainbow Trout. This should spell action for any fisherman in the areas as these gamesters run in huge schools.

Eventually someone will find the life pattern of these fish and learn how to get down to them with the downrigger style of gear. These areas and patterns will probably show the home of the bait fish on which they feed.

In line with the Coho news, there will be a seminar on fishing for Coho Salmon on June 15 at 10 a.m. in the Port Credit Arena on the north side of Lakeshore road. This is put on by the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, Zone 5. Rainbow Trout will also be brought to the attention of anglers as the ministry intends to stock them.

The well known Peter Stickle will be there as he is now the Ontario representative for the Big John Downrigger Co., and will demonstrate this method of fishing the Great Lakes. Alan Walcott of the MONR will give a talk on the project and the meeting will be open to public discussion. The workshop will last till about 3 p.m., but don't let the long session deter you from going.

We have finally got the age-old malaise called 'Cabin Fever' beat. Spring is here and everyone is doing their own thing, as well they should. Just don't let it break any laws, and everyone can enjoy our province with its many opportunities.

The Terra Cotta Conservation Authority will be open on the long weekend of May 16 and the camping areas will be ready to accept those who wish to get out without going too far. Gate fees will be \$2 and camping will be the same as last year, \$2.50 per unit.

I feel it would be a good time to head for the Albion Hills area for some of the elusive Brown Trout that are said to be in the Humber River there.

I sure hope people remember what I said about the late season opening on Lake Nipissing, for Walleye. Well known areas for Walleye are the falls known as Healey Falls, Buckhorn, Burleigh Falls, Bobcaygeon, in fact all the rivers that run into Georgian Bay. I would recommend the use of a No. 6 or No. 8 size short shanked hook with 4-pound test line. The Spring Walleye is a rather timid fish and is easily spooked at times. Hook a worm that is in the beat of shape and put the hook through the nose only. **NOT THE COLLAR.** In this way you will have a worm with a more natural look. As I have said before, try it before you scoff.

When (not if) you catch a Walleye, if it has a tag don't forget to keep the tag if you keep the fish or record the tag number if you release the fish, and mention the release when reporting the size and weight of the fish to the ministry of natural resources. Those caught in Georgian Bay are eligible for entry in a contest co-sponsored by the ministry and the Georgian Bay Anglers and Hunters Club. Send all the information to: District Manager, MONR, Midhurst, Ontario. A draw will be made and a prize awarded to the sender of that tag number.

The season on my own personal favourite fish, the Bass, will open as the last season this year again, along with Muskie, on the 21 or 28 of June, depending on where you fish for Mr. Bignouth or his cousin the Smallmouth Bass. Then all we will have to look forward to is the closing of the seasons. In between these times, nothing but great times in **ONTARIO OUTDOORS.**

Seniors however, once again proclaimed their supremacy in the annual Lord Elgin Soccer Tournament in Burlington on Saturday.

The Juniors' week was highlighted by the amazing scoring display of Ken Flynn. Last Thursday the Juniors tied Perdue 1-1 in a fast-paced game that featured exciting soccer at both ends of the pitch. Ken Flynn scored the lone Georgetown goal in what coach Jack Brown described as an excellent team effort.

This past Monday, the Junior Rebs completely out-classed General Wolfe Juniors of Oakville 6-0 and Ken Flynn notched all the Rebels counters. This six-goal performance must rank as one of the best individual scoring efforts ever in high school soccer. The game was never in doubt as far as Georgetown was concerned and the score could have gone higher had the pitch been in better shape. The steady drizzle throughout Monday made footing treacherous and made Flynn's feat even more remarkable.

The Seniors came up with a disappointing performance last Thursday as they dropped a 4-0 decision to Perdue Panthers at Perdue High School. Although Perdue is considered one of the soccer powers in the area it seemed to coach Tom Beer that his team went into the match over-confident and did not really begin to work at their game until it was too late. Perdue was getting to the ball quicker and controlling play longer and this jumped into an insurmountable lead to put the game out of reach.

On Monday it was a different story for the Senior Rebs as they controlled play, in spite of poor pitch conditions and a

steady drizzle, and played an aggressive heads-up game to knock off Blacklock 2-0. Gary Miller and Tony Pacheco were the goal getters for the Seniors.

This past Saturday the Senior Rebels won the Division "A" title at the Lord Elgin Annual tournament for the third successive year. Twenty-four teams from across the province competed in the three divisions with the championship finals being played at Bronte Shell Park, Iroquois Park and Optimist Park. Aldershot Tigers won the "B" division crown, while White Oaks "B" team took the "C" division title. Georgetown defeated Wilfrid Laurier of Hamilton in the opening game 2-1 with Ian Syme and Ed Paterson scoring the GDHS goals.

The second game almost spelled the end of Georgetown's hopes as the score stood at 0-0 at the end of regulation time. The Rebels took the contest on the basis of winning the penalty shot shoot-out.

The finals pitted Georgetown against the team from Midland and in some quarters before the tournament began, it was felt that Midland would be the eventual winners. Georgetown won the game and the title 1-0 in overtime. Ian Syme again provided the scoring punch.

Unfortunately for the Senior Rebels, their untimely loss to Perdue on Thursday may have cost them a berth in the OFSSA tournament, which decides which team advances on to All-Ontario play. There is a slim chance that the Senior Rebs may slip in, but this won't be decided until later this week. The Juniors, because of their one-win, one-tie and one-loss record to not qualify for the OFSSA tournament.

Tough season opener

Rams open, lose

In a fight filled, rough house game, Halton Hills Rams lost their season opener 21-13 to Orillia in Orillia Monday night. Team manager Howard Dwyer felt that the game's referees had let the contest get out of hand but he felt his players let their emotions get the better of them and didn't play up to potential.

As he stated, "If they had stuck to lacrosse they could have won. We have to stay out of the penalty box." All told, the Rams took 135 minutes in penalties and three players—Glen Sherman, Wade Knight and Jim Chisholm—were tossed out of the game. Unless the team pays a fine, which would enable the three to bypass the league ruling, they must sit out one more game. This bodes ill for the Rams, as their next game is against powerful Huntsville crew, here at home on Thursday evening.

Four Orillia players were also given the toss; one player for a head-butting incident in one of the altercations. This could result in a five-to-seven-game suspension. The first period had both teams basically concentrating on lacrosse and the Rams led at the end of 20 minutes, 4-3. The brawls of the second period allowed Orillia to leap

in front 13-9 and they were never caught. For Orillia, Cam Devine provided the big punch as he counted six times. For the Rams, Paul Wilson had three goals, Bruce Cooksley and Ian Duff came up, with two goal performances while singles went to Steve Wilson, Kevin Mar-

coux, Jim Chisholm, Bruce Green, Glen Sherman and Bill Fox. Georgetown native, Andy Broadbent, picked up two assists in his debut with the Rams. Game time this Thursday night, when the Rams host Huntsville is 8:30 p.m. at the Georgetown arena.

EXCEPTS FROM AN ARTICLE BY DR. MURRAY KATZ WHICH APPEARED IN THE MONTREAL STAR ON MARCH 29, 1975.

"THE CONSUMER often doesn't know what it is, what it will cost him, and yet has to buy it. This is the position most people are in when they purchase a prescription drug."

"The Traditional consumer ignorance about prescription prices has left room for considerable differences in prices depending on which pharmacy the consumer happens to pick."

"Price Posting means that the pharmacist is obliged to publicly place in his store a large poster (usually two feet by three feet size) which list the 50 or 100 most common prescription drugs sold."

"In recent years, consumer pressure has been mounting to have this practice changed. Last year, the Consumers Association of Canada asked for an end to this ban, claiming that prices should be publicly posted in pharmacies. André Ouellet, minister of consumer and corporate affairs, responded that he favored posting in the stores restricted to the generic name or brand name of a drug, its strength or dosage and its price."
