Two bowling records set

Two new record scores were set at the second annual YBC Bursary Tournament held Sunday at Albion Bowl in

Rexdale. Garry Deacon of Village Bowl in Mississauga destroyed the record of 2,583 set by Wayne Hein of Etobicoke last year, when he put together a ten-game total

of 2,969 to win the men's division by over 200 pins. In the women's division, Marilyn Kinnon of Waterloo Lanes notched up a ten-game score of 2,634 to break that record of 2,350, set last year by Janet Peck of Mississauga.

Georgetown's only entry which attracted over 55 bowlers in the final year of the Youth Bowling Council was Paty Syme. She finished with a score of 2,194 to take fourth position among the women, picking up \$15 in prize money for her efforts. Pat bowled extremely well, considering

the high number of games and the tough competition she was up against. She is to be commended for a fine effort and a great performance.

After the tournament was completed, Pat thanked Joan Archibald, who aided her in preparation for the tournament and also expressed gratitude for the great turnout of vocal supporters.

Deacon took the lead from the first game and never gave it up. His first two games were 318 and 405. In second position was another bowler from our zone, Norton Sims of Guelph

who recently was the National Senior Boys Singles crown in Calgary. His score was 2662, while Andre Groulx of Cornwall placed third with 2615.

Other money winners were Gerald Guay of Cornwall 2,551, Ted Basiak of Wallaceburg 2497, David Turbitt of Hamilton 2443 and Jim Gemmill of Scarborough 2421.

The lead in the women's division was tossed around until the fourth game when Miss Kinnon took charge and never looked back. She defeated Ann Desrosiers of Cornwall, two-time National

Senior Girls Singles Champion, who finished second with 2480.

For those of you who missed our first article two weeks ago, Current Ripples is a column designed to keep you informed of what is happening at your new pool, and a channel through which the local Red Cross Water Safety Service can reach the public with Water Safety Tips.

First let me start off with a big THANK YOU to you for your response to and support of the new programs at the pool.

The instructional programs including Red Cross Lessons, Lessons for Pre-Schoolers (Shrimps and Small Fry), Synchronized Swimming, SCUBA, Aquatics, are filled to capacity with about 600 registered in all. The disappointing responses were to lessons for adults and swimming for the disabled, although we are carrying these programs on in spite of low numbers.

The recreational swims have been fantastic! Almost every night we have reached the capacity of 225 with a total of 300 to 350 people using the pool Monday to Friday, and 500 on Saturdays and Sundays.

The complaint repeated most often has been: "The chlorine is too strong!" We are sympathetic to the red and puffy-eyed swimmers, but almost every new pool must have time to balance its chemicals. Ours seems to have settled down already.

Already with complaints come compliments (and we are glad to hear both). The greatest compliment we've received goes to the instructors, who are doing an excellent job with their large classes and to our volunteers, who come in faithfully to help out.

Water Wisdom

This week's safety tip concerns the coming long weekend. Every year in Ontario and across Canada there are water accidents on Victoria Day weekend. People are opening up cottages, taking their boats out for the first run and going on the first canoe or fishing trip of the summer.
