# THE CORPORATION OF HALTON HILLS **BY-LAW 75-19**

A By-law to amend holding by-law 29-69 of the former Corporation of the Township of Esquesing, as amended.

WHEREAS by-law number 29-69 of the former Township of Esquesing being a by-law passed under the predecessor of Section 35 of The Planning Act R.S.O. 1970 c.349, is a bylaw which designates the uses permitted on the lands located in the former Township of Esquesing Planning

AND WHEREAS It is deemed advisable to change the use which may be made of the property known as Part of the northeast half of Lot 1, Concession 8, in the Town of Halton Hills (former Township of Esquesing) in the Regional Municipality of Halton, shown as Part 1 on a plan of reference deposited in the Registry Office for the Registry Division of Halton (No. 20) as plan number 20R-1467; and shown outlined in red on the sketch of survey annexed hereto as Schedule "A";

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE COR-PORATION OF THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS **ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:** 

By-law number 29-69 of the former Corporation of the Township of Esquesing is hereby amended by the addition thereto of a new paragraph to be known as paragraph number 12 which shall read as follows:

DEFINITIONS

in this by-law: "AUTOMOBILE SERVICE STATION" means a building or place

Where gasoline or other motor fuels are kept for sale and for delivery directly into a motor vehicle, and for the performance of minor running repairs essential to the actual operation of motor vehicles and for the sale to the motoring public of goods usual to the trade,

does not include a public garage or an automatic car washing establishment.

'PUBLIC GARAGE' (a) " means a building or place where motor vehicles are kept or stored for repair, but

does not include an automatic car washing establishment a motor vehicle sales tot or an automobile t rvice station. 'HEIGHT' means with reference to a building the vertical distance measured from the average finished

grade level at the front elevation of such building to in the case of a flat roof, the highest point of the roof

surface, or the parapet, whichever is the greater, and in the case of a pitched roof, a point midway between the caves and the ridge, but in calculating the height of a building, any construction used as ornament or for the mechanical operation of the building such as a mechanical penthouse, or a chimney tower, cupola or steeple is not to be included.

'LOT AREA' means the total horizontal area within the lot lines of a lot and in the case of a corner lot having street lines rounding at the corner with a radius of twenty feat (20') or less, the lot area of such lot is to be calculated as if the lot lines were projected to their point of in-

'LOT COVERAGE' means that percentage of the lot area covered by

all buildings above ground level but does not include that portion of the lot area which is occupied by a building or portion thereof and which is completely below ground level, and for the purpose of this paragraph shall be deemed to apply only to that portion of such tot to which the particular zone designation applies.

'LOT DEPTH' means the horizontal distance between the front and rear lot lines but where the front and rear lot lines are not parallel the lot depth is the length of a line joining the mid-points of such lot lines.

'LOT FRONTAGE' means the horizontal distance between the side lot lines measured along the front lot line, but where the front lot line is not a straight line or where the side tot lines are not parallel, the lot frontage is to be measured by a line thirty feet (30') back from and parallel to the chord of the lot frontage, and for the purpose of this paragraph, the chord of the lot frontage is a straight line joining the two points where the side lot lines interesect the front lot line.

'LOT LINE' means any boundary of a lot

front lot line.

'LOT LINE, FRONT' means the lot line that divides the lot from the street.

'LOT LINE, REAR' means the lot line opposite the

'LOT LINE, SIDE' means a lot line other than a

front or rear lot line. (I) 'PARKING AREA' means an area of land which is provided and maintained upon the same lot or tots upon

which the principal use is located and which area. comprises all parking spaces of at least the minimum number required according to the provisions of this by-law, and all driveways, alsies, manoeuvring areas, entrances, exits and similar areas used for the purpose of gaining access to or egress from the said parking spaces,

is provided and maintained in accordance with all applicable provisions of this by-law.

'STRUCTURE' means anything constructed or erected, the use of which requires tocation on the ground, or attached to something having location on the ground. 'USE' means the purpose for which any land, building, structure or premises, or part thereof

is arranged, designed or proposed to be used, or is or may be occupied or maintained, and the word "used" has a corresponding meaning.

'YARD' means an open uncovered space on a lot appurtenant to a building and unoccupied by buildings or structures except as may be expressly permitted in this by-law, and in determining yard measurements the minimum horizontal distance from the respective lot lines is to be used, but

does not include a court yard.

'YARD, EXTERIOR SIDE' means a side yard immediately adjacent to a public street,

'YARD, FRONT' means a yard extending across the full width of a lot between the front lot line and nearest wall of any building or structure on the lot.

"YARD, REAR" means a yard extending across the full width of a lot between the rear lot line and nearest wall of any main building or structure on the lot.

'YARD, 51DE' means a yard extending from the front yard to the rear yard of a lot, and between a side lot line and the nearest wall of any building or structure on the 'YARD, MINIMUM FRONT' means the minimum

depth of a front yard on a lot between the front line and the nearest wall of any building or structure on the lot. (u) 'YARD, MINIMUM REAR' means the minimum depth of a rear yard on a lot between the rear lot line and

'YARD, MINIMUM SIDE' means the minimum width of a side yard on a lot between a side lot line and that nearest wall of any building or structure on the lot,

the nearest wall of any main building or structure on the

# 12.2 'YARD REQUIREMENTS'

Every part of any yard required to be provided by any provision in this by-law shall be open and unobstructed by any structure from the ground to the sky, except that: (a) sills, belt courses, cornices, chimney breast, bay windows, or pliasters may project into any required yard a distance of not more than two feet. .

(b) eaves or gutters, for other than an accessory building, may project into any required yard, a distance of not more than two feet. (c) accessory buildings may be erected in accordance with the applicable provisions of this by law.

(d) light standards, fuel pump islands and fuel pumps of automobile service stations may be erected in accordance with the applicable provisions of this by-law.... (e) fences, freestanding walls, flag poles, antennae, light standards and similar accessory structures and ap-

purtenances, and hedges, trees and shrubs are permitted.

'PARKING AND LOADING FACILITIES' No parking area or space, loading area or space, driveway, manoeuvring area or aisle permitted according to the provisions of this by-law other than parking facilities for a one-family detached dwelling or for any agricultural use shall be used as such unless:

(a) the parking area or space is maintained with a con-

crete, asphalt or gravel surface and (b) the parking area or space is screened by means of a hedge or fence from all streets, highways and nearby Residential Zones or lots used for residential purposes. Not withstanding any provisions of this by-law as amended to the contrary, the lands described in Section 12.4 (x)

hereof may be used for no purposes other than the erection thereon of a building to be used as a public garage and as a place for the storage or repair of farm equipment provided such use compiles with the following provisions:

(I) AREA OF LOT COVERED BY BUILDING: Maximum: 30 percent of total lot area

(II) FRONT YARD: Minimum depth: 30 feet (III) INTERIOR SIDE YARD:

(IV) EXTERIOR SIDE YARD: Minimum width: 30 feet

Minimum width: 15 feet

(v) REAR YARD: Minimum depth: 25 feet (VI) SETBACK:

Minimum setback from any residential use for any structure or open storage use: 30 feet

(VII BUILDING HEIGHT:

Maximum: 35 feet

(VIII) LANDSCAPING, PARKING AND LOADING & REGULATIONS: No parking or loading facility or part thereof shall be located and no land shall be used for the temporary parking or storage of any motor vehicle within five feet of

any lot line or street line or within ten feet of the boundary

of any residential zone. (ix) The parking and loading facilities set out in this subsection shall be provided and maintained on the property described in Section 12.4 (x) hereof: (a) one parking space for every 300 square feet or fraction

thereof of ground floor area of the public garage to be erected plus one parking space for every 750 square feet or fraction thereof of floor area other than ground floor area in the public garage. (b) If the gross floor area of the public garage to be

erected on the lands described in section 12.4 (x) hereof exceeds 2,000 square feet, then one loading space shall be provided on the lands but if the gross floor area of the public garage is in excess of 10,000 square feet then in addition to the one loading space, a further loading space for every additional 15,000 square feet or part thereof of gross floor area shall be provided.
