Police fight local rash of break-ins

Support "moped" ban

Halton Hills may add its voice to a call by Sudbury that motor assisted bicycles be banned from public highways and streets. However supporting Sudbury is about all that the town can do.

The town's clerk-administrator Doug Eritchard reported to the personnel and finance committee Monday night that the town cannot legally take any steps at all to control the use of "mopeds" in Halton Hills.

His report was triggered by a suggestion from the chairman of the committee Harry Levy four weeks ago that stricter controls over the operation of the vehicles be introduced. At present a 14-year-old can drive

one of the vehicles on any street or highway without insurance licence, or safety helmet.

Because the vehicles are governed by the provincial Highway Safety Act the town, Mr. Eritchard reported is totally unable to do anything at all in controlling them.

Sudbury has taken a similar stand against the unlimited use of the vehicles on public thoroughfares and has presented a resolution to the province asking for controls. The province has yet to act on that request.

The town's personnel and finance committee will be presenting Sudbury's resolution to council next week. If council should support the resolution it will then be forwarded to Queen's Park.

Week's bumps and grinds

Two collisions last Wednesday did over \$100 damage to the cars involved.

Leo Coffey of 135 Raylawn and Peter Clarke collided in the parking lot of Georgetown District High School doing \$30 damage to the Clarke vehicle.

A collision on Ewing Street damaged the vehicles of

Clarence Corbett and Fran-coise Nowlan. The Nowlan vehicle suffered \$75 in damages.

No change at pool

A suggestion by the Georgetown Lions Club to change the tote system at the Georgetown outdoor pool to a coin locker setup was turned down at the general administration committee meeting Monday.

Doug Collison, recreation director of Halton Hills explained to the committee that it would cost approximately \$7,500 for the installation of the lockers. "It seems like a large capital cost but it would reduce the staff cost because when the pool is being used checkers would not have to be paid,"

He further explained that, because the outdoor pool is only open for three months every year it would take about 12 years to pay for the cost of the lockers. This would be with a ten-cent charge for the use of the lockers.

The system which the Georgetown Indoor Pool is now using is 25 cents for admission and an extra 10 cents if a locker is wanted.

Councillor Dick Howitt, chairman of the administration committee, suggested charging 10 cents for using the present tote system instead of installing lockers. However, Councillor Howitt's proposal was outvoted by the committee.

The old system at the Georgetown outdoor pool, in

which there is a 25-cent admission charge but no tote charge, will remain for another year.

No sight of site test

Was there a soil test or wasn't there? After a one-month search through Georgetown's dusty back files it seems that, contrary to some of the older Georgetown councillors' opinions, there hasn't been a soil test of the vacant area adjacent to the Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service's James Street building.

If there was a soil test the results are nowhere to be found now.

That area is the proposed site for an addition to the GVAS building. A test of the swampy area must be carried out before any further steps are taken towards the designing of the addition.

When the soil was first mentioned some councillors from Georgetown had recalled that a site test had been carried out previously but a search through the records by town engineer Peter Morris proved fruitless.

The town engineer is now proceeding with new tests.

Raylawn paving

Tenders have been accepted for reconstruction and paving work on Raylawn Crescent. Council last Wednesday night approved a resolution accepting a \$97,757.63 tender for the work which was submitted by Graham Brothers Construction of Brampton.
