Notice is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, in accordance with The Weed Control Act, R.S.O. 1970, Sec. 4, 11, 13, 14 and 20, that unless weed seeds, and noxious weeds growing on their lands within the Town of Halton Hills are destroyed by date of Saturday, June 14, 1975, and throughout the season, the Town may enter upon said lands, and have weeds destroyed, charging the costs against the land in taxes, as set out in the Act.

The co-operation of all property owners is earnestly solicited.

Complaints may be made by telephone, or in writing to the undersigned.

For the information of all property owners, the following are designated as noxious weeds generally in the Province of Ontario.
