Two cars destroyed in fire

Two incidents of car fires over the past weekend completely destroyed the cars involved.

The first fire occurred Saturday on Highway 7 near

the Sinclair Avenue intersection. The owner of the car, R. Spoehr, Prince Charles Drive, had been driving along Guelph Street into town when the car back-fired and burst

into flame. Members of the Citizens Band Radio Club near the scene were the first to notify the fire department and block off traffic from passing near

the flaming vehicle. "Had there been an extinguisher in the car the fire could have been put out instantly," explained Fire Chief Ken Buikema. A fiberglass

hood helped feed the fire according to the chief. The second car fire occurred on the 15th Sideroad Sunday evening. The Fournier vehicle was completely destroyed. Children playing with matches has been attributed to causing a fire doing minor damage to the Zilstra Poultry Farm on the 6th Line near Stewarttown. The first manure fire of the year occurred last week at Meadowlark Growers. Firemen quickly put out the smelly fire. No cause has been given.

Snow in stitches at arena opening

Jim Snow, Ontario minister of government services almost didn't make it to the official opening of the Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena last Saturday after a head-on collision while en route to Georgetown.

The minister received five stitches to close the gash in his forehead, at Georgetown District Memorial Hospital before being escorted to the arena opening by OPP.

The driver of the second car, Eva Hayward has been treated for minor foot injuries while the passenger of her car sustained slight cuts and bruises. The accident occurred at 11:45 a.m. on Highway 7 one mile west of Rockwood.

Damage to the car of Mr. Snow has been set at \$2,000. Charges have been laid against Mrs. Hayward for failure to share the roadway.

Grant for HRCA

A grant has been approved by the ministry of natural resources in the amount of \$21,800 to the Halton Region Conservation Authority.

This grant will assist in carrying out forest development programs in a number of conservation areas in various parts of Milton and Halton Hills.

This development work includes tree planting, woodlot management, fencing boundary lines, culvert installation, as well as trail and sign construction. The total cost of this work is estimated at \$43,600 of which the provincial government pays a 50 percent grant.

The Milk Commission of Ontario by authority vested in it under The Milk Act will undertake an Inquiry into certain aspects of the Milk Industry.

The Inquiry will attempt to determine how, after delivery to the processor, certain elements in the milk distribution chain contribute to the final price paid for fluid milk.

The nature of the Inquiry will include the acceptance of written Briefs and the receipt of Submissions, as well as a series of public meetings throughout the Province.

Persons or groups wishing to make representation to the Commission on any aspect of the Inquiry are requested to write to the Secretary of the Milk Commission of Ontario or to submit written Briefs with the undersigned not later than June 21st, 1975.

Public Hearings will be held at times and places in Ontario to be announced later and those filing Briefs or letters who wish to appear personally will be advised as to the time and place when they will be heard.
