Doug Bellamy, Karen Hauser and Ted Kewley, all Grade 13 students at Georgetown District High School, have been offered Decartes Math Scholarships from the University of Waterloo after achieving high standings in a math competition held at the university. Representing Georgetown, Doug placed first in the school's team with Karen and Ted both placing second (again only within the team).

Last Tuesday afternoon, students belonging to the math club at the high school received awards for their math achievements throughout the year.

Eight students received math letters from the Ontario Institute of Study and Education. Along with a letter, James Gillanders received a book from the OISE for placing second in Ontario in the Grade 10 category.

Students in Grade 9 who were awarded letters are: Patrick Gaskin, Angela Jones, Ferrienne Waters and Anita Woychesko. Paul McAuley in Grade 10, received a letter and from Grade 11 receiving letters were Tom Bushey and Peter Ritchie.

Earlier in the year, 30 students from Georgetown competed against 20,000 other Canadian students at a Junior Math Contest sponsored by the University of Waterloo. Paul Wolfenberg placed first, James Gillanders and Mike Wakefield both placed second within their own team.

At a senior math contest for Grades 12 and 13, sponsored by the Society of Actuaries, 10 Georgetown students com-

peted. Andy Long, Ted Kewley and Tom Bushey placed first, Andy Long placed 78th out of second and third respectively again within the team.

It should also be noted that in a Euclid Math contest for Grade 12 students, sponsored by the University of Waterloo, 1,466 in Ontario. He then earned a place on the Honour Roll. Tom Bushey and Rob Dubien also did very well in the same competition placing second and third on their own team.

Ballinafad United marks 80 years

A large number of worshippers came out on Sunday for the special service to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the United Church of Canada.

Before the arrival of the minister, Mrs. Norman Sinclair, assisted by the junior and senior choir, led the congregation in singing several old time gospel hymns. Mrs. Ernest McEnery accompanied at the piano.

The order of the service was one printed for all United Churches for the special occasion. The two choirs chose to sing a real old time Methodist favourite, "When the Roll is Called Up Yonder I'll Be There."

Instead of a regular sermon Reverend Stiles took the people back fifty years, when, on Tuesday, June 10, in Toronto, congregations of Methodists, with a vast number of Presbyterians, voted to join together as one United Church in Canada.

One nice feature of the local service was seeing former Methodist Presbyterian and Roman Catholic families joining hands and with the greeting, "We Are One in Christ", responding with "We Are One Indeed."

The hymns chosen for this celebration were composed by Alton George Demmons. The first hymn was sung by the congregation. During the service there was a dedication ceremony for three articles of furnishings for the church: first the beautiful cabinet made by Mr. Archie Lawr of the village. Mrs. Emmerson Clarke, on behalf of the UCW, presented the cabinet.

Miss Jean Lawr, who inherited some of her father's talent, was responsible for the lovely Altar Banner which has a gold cross and the letters I.H.S. embroidered on red velvet.

Mrs. Emmerson Clarke spoke a few words to represent the Sunday School. The third article was a beautiful gold pulpit lamp. It was donated by Mr. and Mrs. William Rogers in memory of Mr. Ernest Rogers. Mr. Lawr, Jean Lawr and Mrs. Rogers were present and all three spoke briefly. F. J. Shorthill assisted the minister in the dedication ceremony. The Sacrament of Holy Communion was observed to end a most impressive service.

To further the anniversary celebration, a bounteous lunch was served with a beautiful cake decorated to signify a church with the words "50 years" inscribed on the roof. Mr. Barker, who is Mrs. R. Hinkerton's father, visiting from England, who is a professional baker, made and decorated the cake.

Alcott plaque

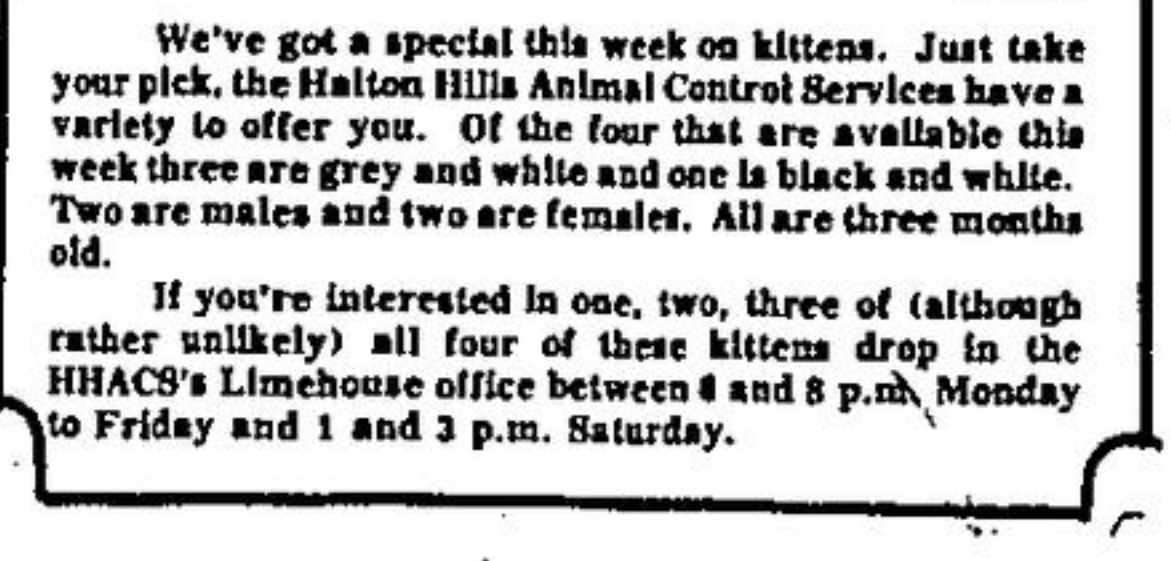
Town council last Tuesday gave official approval to a request that a plaque and a bronze profile, honoring the late Gordon Alcott, be placed in the foyer of the town's new
