Window firm opens

The window business has its 'ups and downs' but for Joe Meurer it's been up all the way.

Joe, owner of Twin Windows, manufacturers of everything from hinged windows, porthole windows, bow windows, smoked windows, sliding windows and even windows that don't do anything but look beautiful.

Joe has been a window man for some 15 years now and has recently expanded his business to a new location on 79 Mountainview Road North in Georgetown. He still has a section of the business in Limehouse but he explained that "we expanded and expanded until we could expand no more."

During the 11 years that Joe has been operating in this area his business has developed from a tiny building in Limehouse to a spanking new plant which covers approximately 12,000 square feet and which cost about \$150,000.

The plant is a Butler building with the showroom and office section built by Reynolds Masonry of Glen Williams. However, Joe did not leave all of the construction to outsiders. Wanting a piece of the action, Joe, his wife Margaret, and members of the staff finished off and added the final touches to the front section.

A native of Cologne Germany, Joe and his wife moved to Canada in 1955 and worked in Toronto before moving to Limehouse. They work as a team) Joe operating the business and Margaret handling the financial and secretarial work.

The operation in Limehouse centres now strictly on the construction of the window frames which then travelled to Georgetown for final assembly and storage.

Twin Windows have designed their own vinyl windows which will be available in the near future. "Now, it's just a matter of
