## Dixon first in All-Ontario meet

Georgetown District High School had seven athletes competing in the All-Ontario OFSSA Track and Field meet held last week at Centennial Stadium in Etobicoke. While their results weren't overwhelming, according to coach Karen Cosgrove, the GDHS athletes held their own with the province's top competitors.

Mike Dixon again earned raves for his performance. He is the All-Ontario champion in the 3,000 metre event and must be considered one of the province's best middle

distance runners even though still a high school athlete. Ross Jeffery placed fourth in the 110 metre hurdles, but his time of 13.9 seconds tied the OFSSA record in this event. The winners' time was 13.7, indicative of the closeness of the race. Ross was also entered in the 400 metre event, but failed to qualify for the final.

The girls' 4 x 400 metre relay team came up with a fine race considering their relative inexperience. This was an open event and the team of

Cathy Masson, Cathy Clark, Doris Tuchel and Susan Alexander placed tenth out of 24 teams. Their time of 4:12 was two seconds off their best time of 4:10 set earlier in the season. Coach Karen Cosgrove feels that with more experience against top competition, the girls could greatly improve their performance. Unfortunately, this will have to wait for next year as the OFSSA meet signalled the end of track and field for this year. Cathy Clark was also a competitor in the 800 metre

event but failed to qualify for the final.

Granville McKenzie suffered perhaps the biggest disappointment of the day in the Senior 110 metre hurdles. Granny had been training hard for the All-Ontario's and although not really satisfied with his times in previous meets, he felt that the high calibre of competition at the All-Ontario would push him to a superlative performance. On the first hurdle of his qualifying heat, Granny's trailing leg clipped the hurdle

and the resultant crack on the ankle did not allow him to finish the race at peak capacity. He didn't qualify for the final but his performances in earlier meets earns him plaudits for a fine season.

Coaches Murray Hall, Donna Metcalfe and Karen Cosgrove should be commended for the improvement in this year's team. Their coaching techniques elicited a tremendous response from the school's athletes which will undoubtedly carry over to next year, when bigger and better things are surely to be expected.
