# Falcons flying

The Georgetown Falcons played in front of hometown fans for the first time this season last week and their friendly atmosphere perhaps contributed to their 2-1 win over Lazio of Toronto. It was encouraging for the players to see so many Georgetown soccer fans out for the contest to support the relatively young, Senior team.

Lawrence Hanlon put in a strong performance in the nets for the Falcons while Bill Xanthopoulos added great spark to the team with his enthusiastic play.

Lazio increased the pressure and their tenacity finally paid off when their centre forward scored on a nice header, three minutes before the end of the game.

Both teams played hard soccer, with Georgetown having the edge in play in the first half. Robert Lister, noted for his speed, broke through for a scoring thrust at the 25-minute mark but was hauled down from behind in a clearing attempt by a Lazio defender. The ball was knocked to safety with the hands, within the penalty area and Georgetown was awarded a penalty shot. Ian Syme made no mistake and buried the ball low in the left hand corner for the score. At halftime, Georgetown held a slim 1-0 lead.

Lazio came on strong in the second half and carried the play to Georgetown. However, stalwart defensive play by Paul Thompson and reliable Peter Koch held Lazio at bay. The Falcons reorganized themselves, making good use of their wingers and this paid off at the 13-minute mark when a three-way passing play culminated in a goal by Richard Mathews.

## Raising a racquet

IT WAS OPENING DAY as James Mason, cut the official ribbon at Saturday's ceremonies. A large crowd was on hand to tour the new facility.

Many of the 125 members of the Georgetown Racquet Club were on hand for the club's opening ceremonies held last Saturday.

Dr. Boyd Hoddinott, president of the club, introduced directors Monty Hyde, William Manderson, Marty Hughes, Brian Buckrell, Graham Brown and Frank Allen to the visitors at the opening.

The new facility provides two courts, a lounge, locker rooms with shower and saunas and a viewing gallery above

each of the courts. An exhibition match demonstrated the speed and accuracy of the game as Aziz Khan and Gulmast Khan played the best two-out-of-three for the on-lookers.

The club occupies a nine-acre site on Armstrong Avenue, on a treed lot that was purchased from the town of Georgetown in September, 1973. Construction on the clubhouse began in August 1974 with the first squash game taking place January 15, 1975.

"The existence and con-

tinuing improvements in our clubhouse and grounds is entirely due to the unselfish donation of time, energy and material by the club members," explained Dr. Hoddinott. "This is truly a member's club."

## Cooked catfish

The Catfish has finally been recognized. Normark Corporation, the makers of Rapala Lures, has brought out a skinning board especially designed for these scaleless fish. As you well know, the Catfish has sharp spines that make it difficult to handle, and the only real way to cook them is skinned. Now it is simple to skin them with this new, adjustable skinning board, and more people might be persuaded to keep this delicious fish now that they know it can be put in a clamp to save getting punctured.

**COURT ACTION:** In the past six weeks, 90 charges have been laid for various infractions of the Game and Fish Act. I mentioned this before but feel it bears repeating, as the courts are now recognizing the need for greater enforcement of the existing laws. A large collection of gill nets, lights, spears and other gear used in poaching has been seized. Charges of this nature have been laid and the offenders now have to appear in court.

Four persons were caught spearing Rainbow Trout in the Coldwater River and had two fish in their possession. The fine handed down was \$800 or \$400 a fish. Pretty expensive food I would say. For that money I could go on a very good fly-in fishing trip and take all the fish I wanted, legally!
