The Halton Hills Rams got off to a good start last Thursday in their first of three games in four days, when they eked out a 12-11 win over Rexdale Warriors for win number two in their home arena. The good times didn't last long, however, as the Rams dropped a heart-breaking 15-14 decision to Orillia Lions in Orillia on Friday night and then were downed 15-12 by the Mississauga Medics in Mississauga on Sunday.

The Rams were never headed by Rexdale Thursday night as they led 2-1 at the end of the first period, 7-6 at the end of two, then held out for the 12-11 victory. Danny Sabadash held a hot hand for Orillia as he scored five goals and notched 45 minutes in penalties, while the Rams clocked only 37 minutes in banishment time.

In Orillia on Friday night, an amazing third period comeback by the Rams fell just short, as the hometown Lions squeezed through to a 15-14 win. Mississauga held a comfortable lead throughout the contest, leading 8-4 at the completion of the first 20 minutes, 11-7 after two periods of play, enroute to their 15-12 win. Welcomes new clubs

Any club or organization in anyway connected with recreation (not necessarily sports) may have the opportunity to register with the recreation department of Halton Hills.

Doug Collison recreation director of Halton Hills, explained to the general administration committee Monday the benefits of registering with the department.

"If a club made a request via the recreation department for a grant to further their activities, the recreation department would then approach the town with the request. Mr. Collison also pointed out that there would be an exchange of information between the group and the department. This way the department could relate information to the general public.

"By having the group registered it would give us information concerning the organization. Then if someone phones us requesting facts about a certain club we could help them. We wouldn't be interfering with the organization one bit," stated Mr. Collison.

Mr. Collison promises that the recreation department would try to leave groups as "loose as possible. But there still would have to be some guidelines."

The clubs wishing to register would have to follow a few guidelines such as: they must be a community, non-profit organization; a financial statement must be presented to the recreation department (which would be kept confidential) and the group must be willing to be open to the public.

"When we say non-profit organization we are not encouraging the groups to lose money. We're just saying that we wouldn't allow one individual to make a profit from
