From the police blotter

## Steal a canoe and stereo too

Six cases of theft under \$200 appear on the police blotter this week.

A green 14-foot, fiberglass canoe was reported missing from the owner's home on

King Street. The canoe was described as having a white interior, stained wooden seats and patches throughout the exterior.

An employee of Canadian

Tire, Guelph Street, was apprehended outside the store with an 8-track car stereo player in his possession. The 19-year-old employee has been charged with theft.

Gasoline coupons valued at \$14 and some gasoline were stolen from a parked car at Standard Products. Two disposable lighters were stolen from the A&P Food Store on

Sinclair Avenue. They were valued at \$3.58.

A light blue boy's bicycle was reported stolen last Saturday from the front of Zellers, Georgetown Market

Centre. The bicycle belonged to a Norval youth, shopping at the store.

Two juveniles were apprehended in the rear lot of Tolton's Auto Body, Guelph Street, with stolen parts from several cars on the lot. The youths were turned over to the Youth Bureau.

Ten cases of wilful damage ranging from rosebushes to plywood were reported to police for further investigation. Elkton Sub-division reported 40 sheets of plywood were damaged at a replacement value of \$200. Two juveniles have been arrested in connection with the occurrence.

Investigation is continuing into the two broken windows at Centennial School this past weekend. Damage has been estimated at \$55.

A street sign and three rose bushes were damaged at Ewing and Hewson Crescent, with a value of \$25.

A home on Eleanor Crescent, a car on Ewing Street, and a house on Ontario street all suffered broken windows. They were valued at less than \$30 each. Investigation is continuing.

A car was wilfully damaged by an unknown person who scratched the sides of the 1973 car in front of the owner's Main Street home.

The rear window of Criterion Carpet, Guelph Street, was broken by two juveniles who paid for the damage.

Two cases of assault occurred while an arrest was being made following a disturbance outside the Georgetown Memorial Arena, Mill Street, Saturday night. Ten instances of violations of the Liquor Licence Act were also recorded, the same evening.

The break and enter of a Metcalfe Court home netted thieves nothing. Two girls entered the home through an unlocked door.

The owner of Kim's Department Store, Main Street South, has reported a fraudulent cheque was issued at his store. The \$50 cheque was returned by the bank marked N.S.F.

The display window of Tracey Lyn Children's Wear, Georgetown Market Centre, was broken by unknown vandals Sunday. Damage has been estimated at \$250.
