Included in the "Welcome to Georgetown" are the names of numerous organizations within the town. Many know the functions of such organizations as the Lions Club or the Kinsmen Club, yet how many persons are familiar with the functions of the Georgetown Chamber of Commerce?

The Georgetown Chamber of Commerce started rolling in the 1940's. One of the first well known persons connected with the town's chamber was the late Bill Nodwell. In the beginning the chamber was referred to as the Board of Trade. With commerce now closely tied with merchants, industries and independent businessmen, the new name is indeed suitable.

Walter Blehn, secretarytreasurer of the Georgetown Chamber, explained that the chamber cannot be compared for the County Chamber. with any of the service clubs as

"The chamber does not go in for fund-raising thus we can't make donations of any large amounts because we don't have the money to spend. The money which we do have is from the membership dues only. So you can't say we are a booming money spending organization," stated Mr.

The main purpose of the Georgetown Chamber Commerce is to serve as a community booster and a unifying force. Members include retailers, tradesmen, industrialists and a few public citizens who are not affiliated with a specific local business. Mr. Blehn outlined the

difficulties in operating such an organization. "It's a hard organization to operate because there is such a wide variety of people and

businesses involved.' There are about 100 members presently in the Chamber. The local chamber belongs to the Ontario chamber and to the County Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Alex Berzinsh is Georgetown. Georgetown's representative

Last year's Chamber ac-

tivities included; setting up an information booth at the International Plowing Match; bringing various speakers to dinner meetings, including Premier William Davis and John Bulloch, the president of the Canadian Federation of Independent Businesses; discussions with the Acton Chamber on the feasibility of future union now that both Chambers are in one community; and participation with the Milton and Oakville Chambers in a pictorial publication boosting this area as an industrial and residential

The Commerce also makes Chamber of Commerce. available to anyone a map of Georgetown. Coples of these maps are available at the Herald office.

Mr. Biehn related one of the many functions the Chamber has been affiliated with in the past. With town council, the Chamber of Commerce, which was then known as the Board of Trades, approached the provincial government to obtain a liquor store in

Mr. Biehn also stated that his phone is constantly ringing with people requesting information concerning the

There was one call which was of particular interest. "One day I received a phone call from a young lady, outside of Georgetown, who was soon to be married. She was planning to spend her honeymoon in this area and she was requesting a list of the activities, places to see and things to do in Georgetown. What could I say?" stated Mr.
