



RECREATION AND WOMEN. At a meeting of the Georgetown Local Council of Women, held last Friday afternoon, Doug Collison, recreation director of Halton Hills, explained the various facilities and programs offered in Georgetown. Standing with Mr. Collison is Honey Cornfoot, president of the Local Council of Women.

Shinny the next sport for town?

"We have tried to organize as wide a range of program activities as possible," stated Doug Collison, Halton Hills Recreation Director at a recent meeting of the Local Council of Women in Georgetown.

In his talk with the women, Mr. Collison explained the new facilities which have just been completed in Georgetown and also described some of the activities involved and planned for the facilities.

Beginning with the Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena, Mr. Collison explained how the dreams of building a second arena in Georgetown became a reality.

"January 8, 1973, I remember that day well. We

held a meeting that day, with various athletic organizations in town and asked the organizations what type of indoor facility they felt was most needed. The answer most of them came back with was a pool, an arena and a theatre. A survey was sent around the town and the results also showed a great desire for those indoor facilities."

Mr. Collison then continued to outline the procedures which were taken and the great amount of citizen and council input in making these facilities available. He then went into more detail concerning the arena and the Georgetown Indoor Pool. Going over the brochure

which the Halton Hills Recreation Department has assembled, explaining the various functions and activities available in the town, Mr. Collison answered questions concerning the programs.

Giving details on the Sports Camp for Girls '75, planned to begin in July, Mr. Collison stated that, "we are meeting that age-old complaint that the recreation department is doing things for the boys but not for the girls."

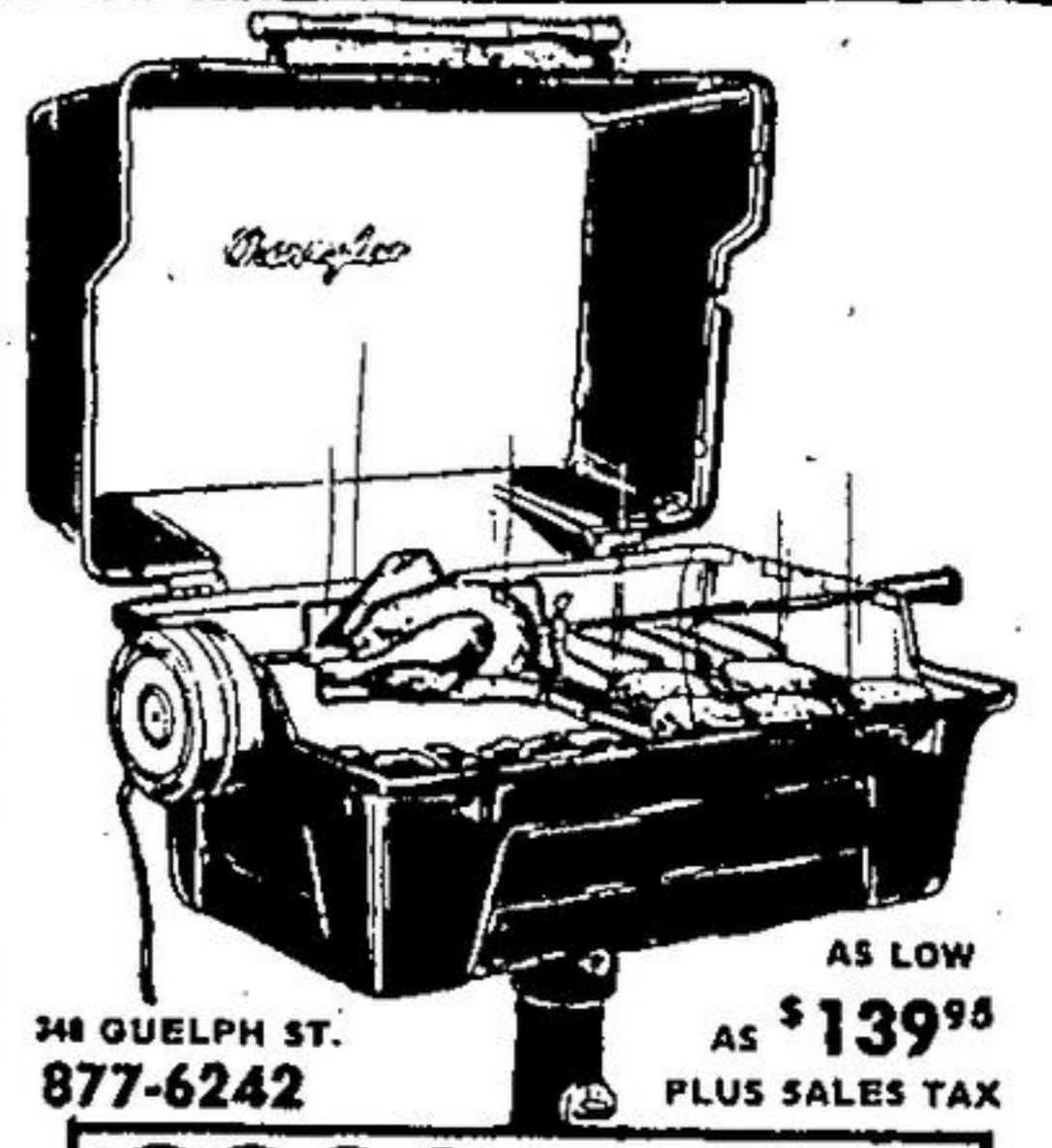
Mr. Collison then revealed some future activities which the recreation department is planning. Such activities would include; ballet and modern jazz dance lessons for adults, formation of swim

teams, adult swimming instructions, recreational games in the water and the formation of a "shinny" team.

"I'm really excited about forming a shinny team. This would allow more ice time for the boys. The boys could play free of instruction and constant coaching and if they wanted 15 guys on the ice at one time, let them have 15 guys on the ice," stated Mr. Collison.

It was an informative afternoon for the Local Council of Women and for Mr. Collison as many of the women gave suggestions and requests for other possible activities for Georgetown.
