

Town okays Lord's Day amendments

# And on the seventh day

After much debate and controversy, the town of Halton Hills passed two bylaws pursuant to the Lord's Day (Ontario) Act, at last Tuesday night's council meeting.

Basically what the bylaws state, are the hours during which a sport or particular activity may charge admission on a Sunday.

Doug Pritchard, clerk-administrator for Halton Hills, explained that after the billiard hall in Georgetown

requested that they lawfully be allowed to be open on Sunday. Mr. Pritchard had to examine the bylaws in the various towns within Halton Hills.

Because of differences in the bylaws of each town, the town of Halton Hills decided to draw up a new series of bylaws pursuant to the Lord's Day (Ontario) Act to unify the entire area.

In effect By-law 75-58 states that admission can be charged on Sunday between the hours

of 1.30 p.m. and 12 midnight for such activities as, baseball (hard-or softball), football, (rugby or association), soccer, lacrosse, hockey tennis, cricket, basketball, lawn bowling, indoor bowling, athletic contests, public skating (roller and ice) go-cart racing, horse shows, golf, flying, badminton, trade shows and squash.

At the council meeting, Councillor Roy Booth pointed out that this bylaw left room

for additional sports or activities to be possibly added. The other bylaw dealt with particulars with other activities. According to the bylaw billiard halls and pool halls can be open on Sunday between the hours of 1.30 p.m. and 10.00 p.m.

During the months of Sep-

tember and October, such sports as motor vehicle racing and motorcycle racing can be held between 1.30 p.m. and 7.30 p.m.

Agricultural exhibitions or shows and fall fairs can charge admission and can run from 12 noon to 12 midnight on a Sunday.

## Courts approved

Georgetown will have four new tennis courts in the very near future. The courts will be built at the Gordon Abbott Memorial Arena at a cost of \$52,000. However, a provincial grant of \$14,000 will reduce the town's portion of cost to \$38,000.

The final reading to a bylaw authorizing the construction of the courts was given at Halton Hills council, Tuesday evening.

## Town will pay half of river bank repairs

The Town of Halton Hills will share the cost of erosion control work to be done on the Logan property in Glen Williams.

Mayor Tom Hill received a letter from Harry Watson, general manager of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, requesting the town to pay a share of the costs. The conservation authority estimated it would cost \$250,300 for the control work.

It was decided at town council last Tuesday evening, that Halton Hills will pay 50 percent of the costs.

Liz Clifford, president of the Georgetown auxiliary thought that perhaps this year's drive would be more successful than last year. However, her hopes seem to be futile. "We are all very disappointed. I guess some people leave it from one pay day to another. We're going to have a 50-50 draw because we have got to do something to raise the money," stated Mrs. Clifford.

Mr. Richard E. Willis, president of Irwin-Dorsey, stated, "We know nothing about the award until that envelope was opened."

Competing with such huge companies as the Macmillan Company of Canada Limited McGraw-Hill, Ryerson Limited etc. Mr. Willis considered this award a "real big plus for us to receive recognition with all these other companies involved."
