Halton Liberals think 'provincial'

Time, Reader's Digest must pay: Sen. Davey

Senator Keith Davey hasn't changed his mind on a lot of things, he doesn't like most Canadian newspapers and he certainly isn't going to give Time or Reader's Digest any breaks when it comes to advertising concessions.
Senator Davey was the guest speaker at the Halton Federal Liberal Association annual meeting held last Wednesday night in Oakville. In an entertaining speech to the approximately 65 party members present, Senator Davey noted that he has not changed his stand on a lot of issues that he first came up with while chairman of a Senate "White Paper" study on the print media in Canada.

He noted that the federal government, despite strong criticism against the stand, will not change its decision to end special tax concessions that allow Canadian companies advertising in either Time or Reader's Digest magazines, to list the costs of that advertising as taxable deductions.

"We don't want to set up a cultural iron curtain between the U.S. and Canada," Senator Davey commented, "however we must do something to promote our national press." Lamenting the recommendation in his report on the end to Time's and Reader's Digest's concessions, to the adoption of "Canadian Content" regulations by the Canadian Radio and Television Commission Senator Davey predicted that it will stimulate the Canadian magazine industry. He noted that eight Canadian magazines will hit the newsstands as soon as the Time legislation is passed.

As for the fears of some that Time and Reader's Digest will not be available in Canada once they lose their special status, Senator Davey commented, "They will still be there. However they'll be coming into Canada on exactly the proper basis they should be on; the same way as Playboy, Esquire, The New Yorker or any other American magazine is on."

He noted that there are approximately 135 American magazines flooding into Canada. Senator Davey also pointed out that more issues of Playboy are sold in Canada each month than the 17 largest Canadian consumer magazines in total. On top of that, he added, there is the tremendous American comic book industry which sells over 85 million comic books in Canada every year.

Speaking on the Canadian newspaper business—of which he was highly critical in his report—Senator Davey complained that the printed media in this country provides constant checks on all aspects of society, except on itself.

The role of newspapers, he said, "must be to prepare its audience for social change. Briefly commenting upon the expected Ontario provincial election Senator Davey, one of the two key men in the organization of the Liberal's last federal election campaign, predicted a swing towards Bob Nixon and the Ontario Liberals.
"This is the first time he

(Bob Nixon) is actually thinking that he is going to win."

The provincial election in the fall appears to be the local federal association's chief concern as well. Walter Elliot, Oakville, the newly elected president of the association, told the members of the party that they should concentrate their efforts in the coming

months on the provincial scene. Also elected last week to the federal association's local executive was Laurie Harris of Georgetown who will serve as a vice-president of the group. Completing the executive are: Slim Streek, executive vice-president; Dan Whitefield, vice-president; and Ernie Zechman, treasurer; all of whom are from Oakville.
