OHA approves town Jr. 'B' team

It's now official, a Junior "B" team will be operating in Georgetown for this coming season. Dave Branch, an OHA secretary, confirmed with this paper on Monday that Georgetown had been accepted into the OHA Junior "B" fold.

The Georgetown entry will be competing in OHA Group 7 along with teams from Burlington, Oakville, Brampon, Milton, Streetaville and Dixie. The members of this league are due to meet sometime in the near future to set up the league's schedule and the format for playoffs. According to the OHA, the only stipulation that they will make is that a group winner be decided on by March 14 in

order to advance into playdowns. The Georgetown Junior "B"s coach Paul Robinson expects the league to be very competitive, with a high calibre of hockey on display for the hockey buffs' entertainment. In backing up his point, Robinson noted that

Oakville advanced all the way to the All-Ontario Jr. "B" finals last year and would probably provide the league's stiffest opposition.

Although no players have been inked as yet. Robinson indicated that the club has been in touch with several prospects but contended that it was too early as yet to expect definite commitments.

The Georgetown Junior "B's" will open training camp August 20th and it is expected that about 50 hopefuls will attend. All the players who attend camp will be there by invitation only and the battles for places on the club are expected to provide great spectator interest. Robinson feels that, even though his club is a first year entry, it can and will be competitive. There will be no break once the training camp gets under way and exhibition games are already being lined up which will lead the team directly into the regular schedule.

In order to get the team into fighting trim the exhibition schedule is being worked into bringing higher bracketed teams to town and one team that is expected to do pre-season battle is the Toronto Marlies. As yet there has been no official word from team management regarding pre-season competitors, but a game against a Junior "A" team has been set up for Sunday, September 14.

A solid foundation for Georgetown's newest bookey endeavour is currently being laid by the team executive and it's obvious from the plans currently being formulated that the team has a bright future. 
