Coho poor fish for Credit

More on the Salmon workshop at Port Credit recently. Joan Rolings communications officer for the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, was on hand to give out information on their work at the Credit River. They gave out some 400 brochures, so my estimate of 300 persons at the meeting was, apparently, short. It was a beautiful, sunny day and Father's Day at that, so that was an exceptionally good turnout.

The MONR was represented by Al Wainlo, who stated that there are inherent problems with the Coho program, even saying that some of the fish that were planted in the Humber River died at the mouth, shortly after stocking in that river.

Coho Balmon, identified by a black tongue among other things, lives only three years then at the instant they get the urge to run to spawn, a physiological transformation takes place and the fish begins to die. This is evidenced by the colour and shape of the fish-with the flesh sometimes coming off the body in chunks-before spawning actually takes place. A general consensus of epinion was that the only way to go after the Coho was in the take itself.

I went last Saturday with the charter boat out of St. Catharines operated by Ron Penfound and Malte Anrep out of Port Dalhousie on the Twelve Mile Creek. We ran out of the harbour to where the water dropped off from 60 feet to 120 feet, and started a trolling pattern in a line from the C.N. Tower, which was visible in Toronto to the Niagara. River and found fish right off. This style of fishing is still brand new to Ontario and the person who finds the correct formula for taking these fish will make a name for themselves.



Ron and Malte have more than \$14,000 invested in their boat and other gear, including rods for the clients they take out, and I feel they are the ones that could do it. I a want to be on board when they hit the jackpot. We passed over literally thousands of fish that showed up on the sonar chart graph paper. Over 300 feet of water, the fish were still on structure which was a steep drop off, but they were at 25 to 35 feet from the surface. Downriggers get you down quickly and keep your lure in front of the fish.

Why not book in with these fellows and get in on the action? At the worst you get a fantastic boat ride. Next week I hope to have something on the DAMS OF THE CREDIT RIVER.

In the rest of Ontario big muskles are being taken, and the final Bass season opens on Saturday. The Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters has compiled a truly great proposal on the Moose management program for Ontario.
