

# Lights, camera, action!

First it was Moose Falls, then it was a little place with no name and now it is Indian Falls. But to us, it's good old Georgetown. No matter what the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation calls it, a rose by any other name.....

Last Sunday a crew of around 50 people—lighting technicians, costumers, camera men, sound crew, a director and producer—cramped into the back offices of the Herald to tape a few scenes of a new CBC drama series.

The play is Henrik Ibsen's "An Enemy of the People," a satirical comedy based on a Swedish village of the 1890's. The town's water supply has become polluted and the local government refuses to let the facts be known, at the risk of spoiling the tourist in-

dustry, recently developed due to the discovery of a hot spring.

The play was adapted for television by Norman Klenman to portray the 1920's in Canada. The program, when pieced together for showing this fall, will be 90 minutes in length.

The Sunday session here followed a morning taping in Milton and three days in the Toronto area gathering outdoor and interior scenes that would be difficult to duplicate in a CBC studio.

The program features Robyn Gammel in the lead role with Cedric Smith, and John Friesen as main characters.

Many of the scenes taped were only a few minutes in length as well as cover shots of the room itself for effects.

The sound crew recorded the Heidelberg press (still used for job printing) for special effects for the series and to keep in the CBC sound library.

Rather than film the new drama series it was decided to video-tape the program to give a "live" feeling about the show and for speed and accuracy. A portable television camera on a dolly was used to shoot the scenes in full colour on studio recorders stored in a large van.

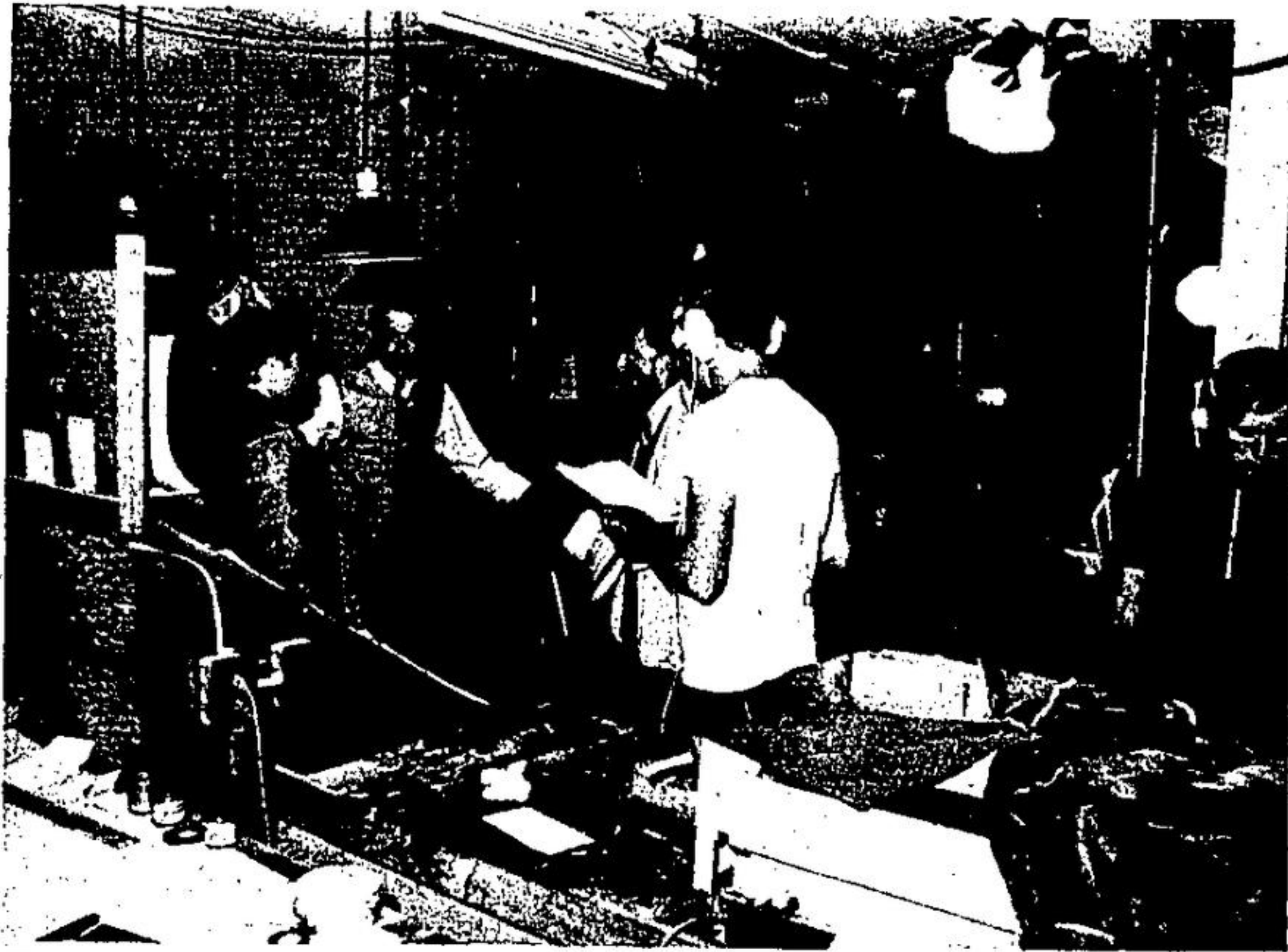
The entourage arrived in town with three large trucks, a motor home and several private cars, all necessary for the production.

The motor home housed costumes and make-up for the actors who took part in the scenes, and a special generating truck provided the power for the many lights necessary for quality production.

A tentative date for airing of the program has been set for December 7 of this year, but that may be changed according to CBC spokesmen.

The program also features Georgetown's own, Garfield McGillivray, as a press operator in one of the scenes at the Indian Falls Herald.

Mr. McGillivray was outfitted with a costume of the era and was set to work operating the presses, as he does each day at the Herald.
