

Annual chamber tournament Hosts hold onto the silverware

In the annual Chamber of Commerce golf tournament held last Thursday at the North Halton Golf and Country Club, the local chamber proved to be poor hosts as they walked off with the trophy which goes to the team with the lowest gross score. The

trophy has been offered by the local chamber since 1971 and this year's triumph marks the second year that the Georgetown chamber has claimed the prize. The Rotary Club of Acton won the trophy in 1971, and the Lions Club of Brampton laid

claim to it in 1972. In 1973 the local chamber won it for the first time and in 1974 the team representing the Brampton Board of Trade was presented with the silverware. The members of the winning Georgetown Chamber of Commerce team—Ted Worrall,

Jim Jones, Phillip Jones and Ken Allen—announced that the \$50 cheque which also goes to the winning team will be donated to the John T. Armstrong Memorial Fund. The winning score was 279. The Georgetown Rotary Club finished in second place with a low gross score of 302.

David Convery, who completed the course with a 78, was runnerup. The low net winner was Don Ferguson with a score of 68. Runnerup, George Wagner, carded a 61. The two special award winners were George Gray, who was closest to the hole on the 9th green (approximately three feet) and Rick Wilson who hit the longest drive on the third hole.

Bob Urquhart was the individual low gross winner.

McCandless squeezes win

The Georgetown Gage Stationary juvenile baseball team squeaked out another victory over the past week, edging Brampton 8-6 behind Mike McCandless's six-hit pitching.

Georgetown struck early in the game gaining two runs in the first on hits by McCandless and Larry Peterson. The final line score was: Georgetown eight runs on 13 hits, three errors and Brampton six runs on six hits

and five errors. The Gage gang plays in Campbellville Wednesday before travelling to Sarnia on Saturday to compete in the Gold Bat Tournament.

They picked up two runs in their half of the first inning as Malton pitcher, Greg Edwards, had control problems. He walked three batters and allowed one hit before retiring the side.

As it turned out, however, the Merchants were getting men on base but failing to score and this kept the game close. The Merchants picked up single runs in the fourth and seventh innings, while holding Malton to single runs in the second and fourth innings to record the 4-2 win. All told, the Merchants left 12 men on base but potential runs have little bearing in the line score.

Grant Usher went the distance for the win, and although he appeared shaky in spots, always managed to come through in tight situations. Grant recorded seven strikeouts and walked two batters. Losing pitcher, Edwards, fanned seven Merchants but the most telling statistic was the ten walks he issued.

The defensive play of the game was made by centrefielder, Bob "Grover" Marchand, in the eighth inning. With one out, Malton first baseman Gary Timmins, laced a drive to deep centre field. Marchand was off with the hit and hauled the ball in with an over-the-shoulder catch barely ten feet from the fence. Marchand got an admiring round of applause from the fans when he trotted to the bench at the end of the inning.

Friday's contest against Glen Williams will be played at the fairgrounds with starting time slated for 8:15 p.m.

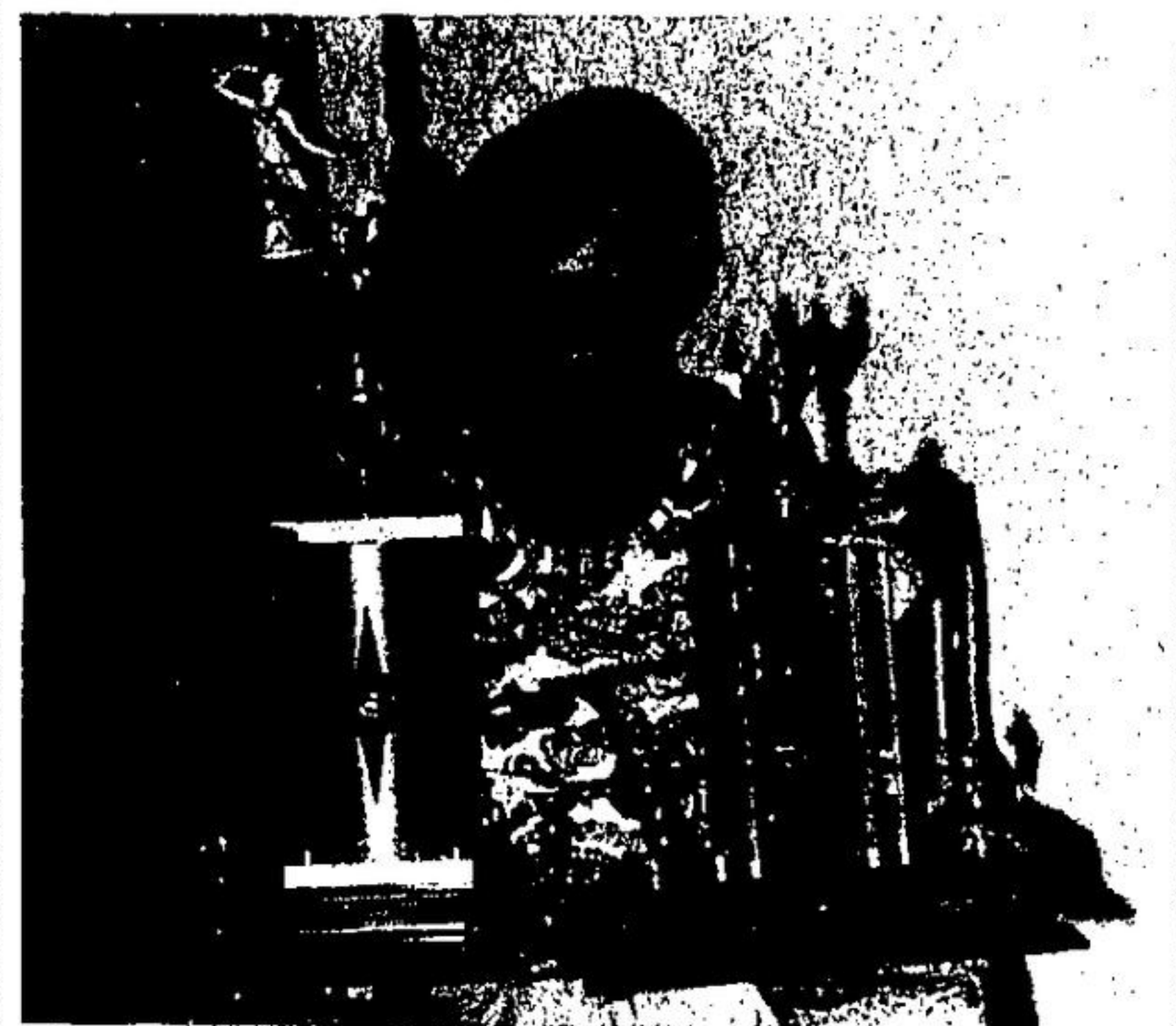

Thursday and Friday. The Halton and Peel Association, has decided to cancel all Minor and Major Mosquito games scheduled for this Wednesday (July 2nd) in tribute to the memory of Kevin. In addition to the cancellation of Wednesday's games the Halton and Peel Association has decided that a minute of silence will be observed prior to the commencement of other games this week.

The Georgetown Minor Soccer Association announced that its teams would also be observing a minute of silence out of respect for the Robbins

family's grief, in all games scheduled for this week.

As a further tribute to Kevin, the Halton-Peel Association will be donating a trophy in his name at the completion of the season's play. As yet, no specific details regarding the trophy have been released.
