The grant which was awarded this year to Divertissement Pour Enfants from the Opportunity for Youth program, totalled \$7,530 which is a smaller sum of money than previously awarded. CAPS '75 means fun, learning

Just in its second week, CAPS '75 is already proving to be as successful as last summer. CAPS '75 (Creative Activities for Pre-schoolers) sponsored by a federal OFY grant, is being held at Knox Presbyterian Church under the direction of Brenda and Kevin Fisher of Georgetown.

Under the Opportunities for Youth Program, CAPS '75 was given a total of \$5,500 which covers the wages of the students employed. Brenda explained that the \$1 registration fee which is charged per week covers the cost of the materials and equipment needed.

Registration is on a weekly basis and any child between the ages of three and five years old can enroll. However, Brenda explained that enrollment has been so successful that a number of weeks have already been filled. 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Glen hall getting all spruced up

At first glance it could be considered a diaster area. But looks are deceiving in this case, for the Glen Williams Community Hall is actually undergoing a tremendous

Steve Mitchell, from Toronto; a previous resident of Glen Williams, is in charge of the reconstruction of the hall. A grant under the federal government's Opportunities for Youth program totalling \$4,830 is making his project feasible. Out of the 20 or so applications five students were hired to do the work necessary in order to restore the hall to useable condition. Ken Heaton, Bev Smith, Stan Hancock, James Taylor and Brenda Davison were those

An extension which was built onto the front of the building years ago has already been removed, the inside partially stripped. The project indeed is well underway.

Steve, a fourth year architectural student at the University of Toronto applied for the position as supervisor end was chosen.

Steve explained that the monies obtained from the grant cover only the wages. Money which has been voluntarily raised and which is still yet to be raised goes towards the materials needed.

An auction sale held in the Glen in the spring gave the project a great headstart by raising some \$1,600. Sheridan Nurseries donated 100 bushes. which were sold, making another \$500 and residents of the Glen have made private donations. However, Steve plans on carrying through a number of other fund-raising events for the materials still

The hall, which was built in 1870, should have its face completely lifted by Sep-tember. Steve plans on removing the floor so that holding tanks for washrooms and kitchen facilities can be installed.

A mezzanine will be built the kitchen and

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washrooms and a library is planned to be housed in a section of the building.

Once the hall is completed it will be used as a community hall, open for meetings and any other events the residents of the Glen wish to hold in the building. Steve anticipates a possible day-care centre to be set up in the hall, but this is only a possible future plan.

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
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
