Glen shaves Perks in the final

Hot time in Georgetown Industrial Fastball tournament

An industrial league fastball tournament always seems to have a flavour of its own to set it apart from other tournaments where teams of a higher calibre are involved. The unexpected becomes the expected. Teams given little chance of winning often come up with superlative performances and, of course, the fiercely partisan fans can always be relied upon to stir things up should an unwanted calm set in.

The annual Georgetown Industrial Fastball League Tournament held at the Georgetown Park over the weekend was no exception to the rule and the championship final, which pitted Glen Williams against Perks Barber Shop, provided a fitting if somewhat anti-climatic ending to the affair.

The tournament got underway Saturday morning and continued throughout the day. As the dust settled on Saturday evening the tournament ran true to form with several surprising decisions being handed in. Curwood dropped both their games, 10-5 to Casselman's and 5-2 to Peel Fence and were eliminated from further play. The team

from Erin caught everyone by surprise as they knocked off Random 5-4, then continued their winning ways by dropping Taurus Steakhouse of Brampton 4-3. The luck of the draw had Glen Williams facing Peel Fence, who have been involved in the finals for the past several years, but the local team defeated the Bramalea visitors 6-4 and thus relegated them to the consolation division. Defending champions, Perks Barber Shop, had an easy time in their first outing, whipping Club Billiards 10-2, but were

almost eliminated from the tournament by Norval. The game was tied 5-5 at the end of the regulation five innings but Perks were given the nod to advance on the basis of their having nine base runners to Norval's five. As the first day drew to a close, the Flyers, Norval, Curwood, Casselman's, Taurus Steakhouse and Random had been eliminated. Club Billiards, Kinsmen and Peel Fence remained in the battle for the consolation championship while Perks Barber Shop, Erin and Glen Williams advanced in the

championship round. The third round byes went to Peel Fence in the consolation championship while Glen Williams was given a respite in the championship series. The semi-finals for both divisions were close affairs as Perks downed Erin 2-1 and the Kinsmen slipped by Club Billiards 3-2. The stage was now set for the finals with Peel Fence meeting the Kinsmen and Perks facing Glen Williams. In the consolation final superior pitching allowed Peel Fence to lave the diamond 5-2 winners. It should be

remembered, however, that the Kinsmen were not even mentioned as possible contenders before the tournament started and their scrappy hustling play gained them many new fans. If they continue in the same vein in regular season industrial league play, they could become a team to contend with. As mentioned the championship final was a bit anti-climatic and effectively over by the fifth inning. It had been expected that the Glen team would be one of the finalists in pre-tournament predictions

but what was really not expected was that Perks would advance as far as they did. They are currently in sixth place in the industrial league standings and credit for their tournament performance must rest on the shoulders of Bob Fendley. He pitched in all three of the team's wins prior to the championship game but the strain of 19 innings in a day and a-half left him ineffective in the final. Young Jeff Haines of the Glen deserves full marks, as well, as it was the strength of his right arm which carried his team to the championship

laurels. In the final the Glen struck for seven runs in the opening two innings to put a damper on Perks' championship hopes. Perks fought back with four runs in the third inning but it was their last gasp as the combination of Jeff Haines and a strong hitting display by the whole Glen team settled the issue. The final score in the championship game was Glen Williams 12 - Perks Barber Shop 5. The many fans who took in the two days of the tournament were treated, for the most part, to some fine games. For

many, the high standard of play was surprising, as was the enthusiasm for the game shown by members of all teams. Regular schedule play in the industrial league now continues and it is to be hoped that the fans that turned out for the tournament will continue to view industrial league ball. The tournament was well organized and credit for this must be given to Don Fendley, president of the industrial league and his executive. Credit must also be given to Gerry Perkins and his umpiring crew.
