All-Stars out-shone by Hillsburgh

All the aspects of an All-Star game were on display last Wednesday in Hillsburgh as defending league champions Hillsburgh took on the Halton Ladies Softball League All-Stars. Players from both sides fraternized openly and engaged in good natured ribbing before the game got underway, and the spirit of friendly competition even extended to the stands where the spectators - the majority of whom were Hillsburgh supporters - gave warm rounds of applause to all the players when they were introduced.

The spirit of friendly competition which encompasses an All-Star game can sometimes lead to shoddy performances but this was not the case in Hillsburgh on Wednesday as both teams shone.

Hillsburgh won the game 4-2, behind the five-hit pitching of Rhonda Carney, who was named the game's Most Valuable Player, but Ev Metler of Georgetown, who took the loss for the All-Stars, also pitched well, yielding only eight hits.

Hillsburgh pushed their first run across the plate in the bottom half of the (Irst inning, on singles by Judy Rash, who scored, Marilyn Eagles and Mary Bullock. Ev Metler settled down after this and held Hillsburgh off the scoresheet until the fifth inning. The Ali-Stars also wasted little time as they counted their first run of the night in the top of the second. Randi Leithwood of Streetsville walked, to open the inning. She was advanced by Ev Metler who singled, then Shelley Debenham Streetsville banged out a single to tie the game.

The score remained knotted, with both teams playing excellent defensive ball, until the top of the fifth when Hillsburgh pushed three big runs across the plate to take control of the game. Nancy Reynolds walked to open Hills burgh's fifth, and advanced to second on Judy Rash's sacrifice. Rhonda Carney flied out but the next batter, Marilyn Eagles, banged a double to score a run. 
the league will now realize that Mississauga is not the seemingly invincible machine
