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**Fairground facilities**

**\$40,000 for washrooms**

The proposed washrooms and changerooms facilities for the Georgetown Fairgrounds will cost a maximum of \$40,000, stated Pat Sheehan, facilities superintendent with the Halton Hills Recreation Department.

A plan which was drawn up in 1969 for washroom and changeroom facilities for the fairgrounds outlined a \$15 cost per square foot for the facility. However, the revised costs have reached \$30 per square foot, twice the amount quoted in 1969.

Mr. Sheehan explained some of the reasons for the price increase which are not merely due to inflation. An extensive circulating system is planned to be installed, thus eliminating windows. A heating system is also tentatively planned.

With the heating system, the facility could be used year-round. The washroom and changeroom facilities, which have been desperately needed at the fairgrounds for many years, now would be built between the two sets of bleachers. This location would be ideal, for it would cater to 80 percent of all the activities in the area. Also, the needed water lines are already present at that location.

locations in the fairgrounds which would be ideal for flooding for skating rinks. A fireplace could be installed between the two rinks and it would be a great drawing card for many families.

"If you utilize the facilities in the winter you can justify the increase," stated Mr. Sheehan.

The recreation department received approval at the general administration committee meeting to call tenders, in accordance with the plans submitted by the recreation department.

**Feud continues over recreation**

More ammunition for the works and recreation departments continuing feud over the responsibility of maintenance of the parks within Halton Hills was added thanks to a recommendation from the general administration committee. Its members suggested that a representative from the works department be present at the recreation advisory meetings.

Two major problems were outlined by Robert Austin, engineer for the town of Halton Hills. "They must establish a standard or level of service for the parks such as flower beds should come before the committee for approval."

A crew of nine men taking care of the parks as it is."

"We are responsible for the maintenance of the parks. The recreation department is responsible for the program," furthered Councillor Ern Hyde. "If park maintenance was the worst problem of the recreation department, they'd be in damn good shape," summarized Councillor Cox.

Responsibility for the maintenance of the parks lies within the works committee realm, therefore it was decided that any request for maintenance should go directly to the engineer, and requests for additional projects come to the committee, rather than delegate a further member to act as liaison between the two departments.

**Thieves working on cars**

Cars were the targets of thieves over the past week with ten separate instances being recorded by Halton Regional Police in Georgetown. Goods stolen from cars range from cameras to sunglasses with many items being stolen as the cars were parked in the driveways of the owners.

Of the ten cases, three occurred on McIntyre Crescent, with multiple occurrences on Guelph Street, Wesleyan Street and McGillivray Crescent in town. **Fire survey of town**

A fire protection survey will be conducted in the town of Halton Hills by the town's Advisory Organization of Canada. The organization had requested approval by the town. However, at the general administration committee meeting Monday, the overall opinion expressed by most of the councillors was that the survey would be conducted whether or not permission was granted.

Fire Chief Holmes stated that such an organization "just shows up at your door and there's nothing you can do about it."

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
