## Festival organizers well prepared, but..

After almost seven months of extensive planning, organization, and tremendous amounts of hard work involving over 200 volunteer workers and 25 program coordinators, Erin's Founders Day Festival was all but washed out. The heavy rain storms which ruled the entire weekend seemed to keep the thousands upon thousands of would-be participants at home.

Everything was going great up to Saturday morning. A giant parade planned for 10 a.m. was to mark the opening of the gala event. It was raining on and off throughout the morning but, as fate would see it, the heaviest downpour came at about ten minutes to ten. Many of the floats were completely ruined by the rains.

Many of the events scheduled for outside areas had to be cancelled because of the continuous downpours. However, there were many events planned for the fairground coliseum, but, apparently, the rain kept all too many away from Erin.

The Erin Founders Day Association planned events for every age. Some of the planned events for the weekend were: two guest appearances by Charlie Farquharson, a band concert by the Guelph Royalaires, games and amusements for kiddies and adults, a farmer's market, an egg-throwing contest, a spaghetti-eating contest, the crowning of 'Miss 1900 Bathing Beauty' and a kissing booth.

Even those events which were not cancelled attracted but a handful of people.

Last year's Founders Day was only an afternoon affair and, to the surprise of all those involved in the preparations, a crowd of between 8,000 and 10,000 turned out.

June Pielt, a program co-

ordinator, explained that one of the main reasons for holding the Founders Day is to raise money towards a recreation complex for Erin. Last year a little over \$3,000 was raised.

However, Mrs. Pielt explained the primary aim of Founders Day. "It's to create a community spirit. It's a time when people can get together, relax and have a good time."

One may ask, how does a town with a population of about 2,000 stage such a large event? Mrs. Pielt stated that, if it wasn't for the co-operation of so many of Erin's residents, Founders Day would not be what it is.

In January of 1975 a public meeting was held in the municipal hall. The huge turnout immediately displayed the enthusiasm of the Erin residents. Volunteers were broken up into groups into the categories of their choosing such as amusements, special events etc.

In mid-April the Association began advertising, covering a radius of Toronto, Hamilton, Guelph and Owen Sound. From there on it was just lots of work and organization.

If it wasn't for the rain, Erin's Founders Day would undoubtedly have been a huge success. No doubt the association, the volunteers and the other residents of Erin, are going through somewhat of a disheartening period. However, it is evident that, through the sheer determination and hard work set forth by the community, next year's Erin's Founders Day will be all that much bigger and better.

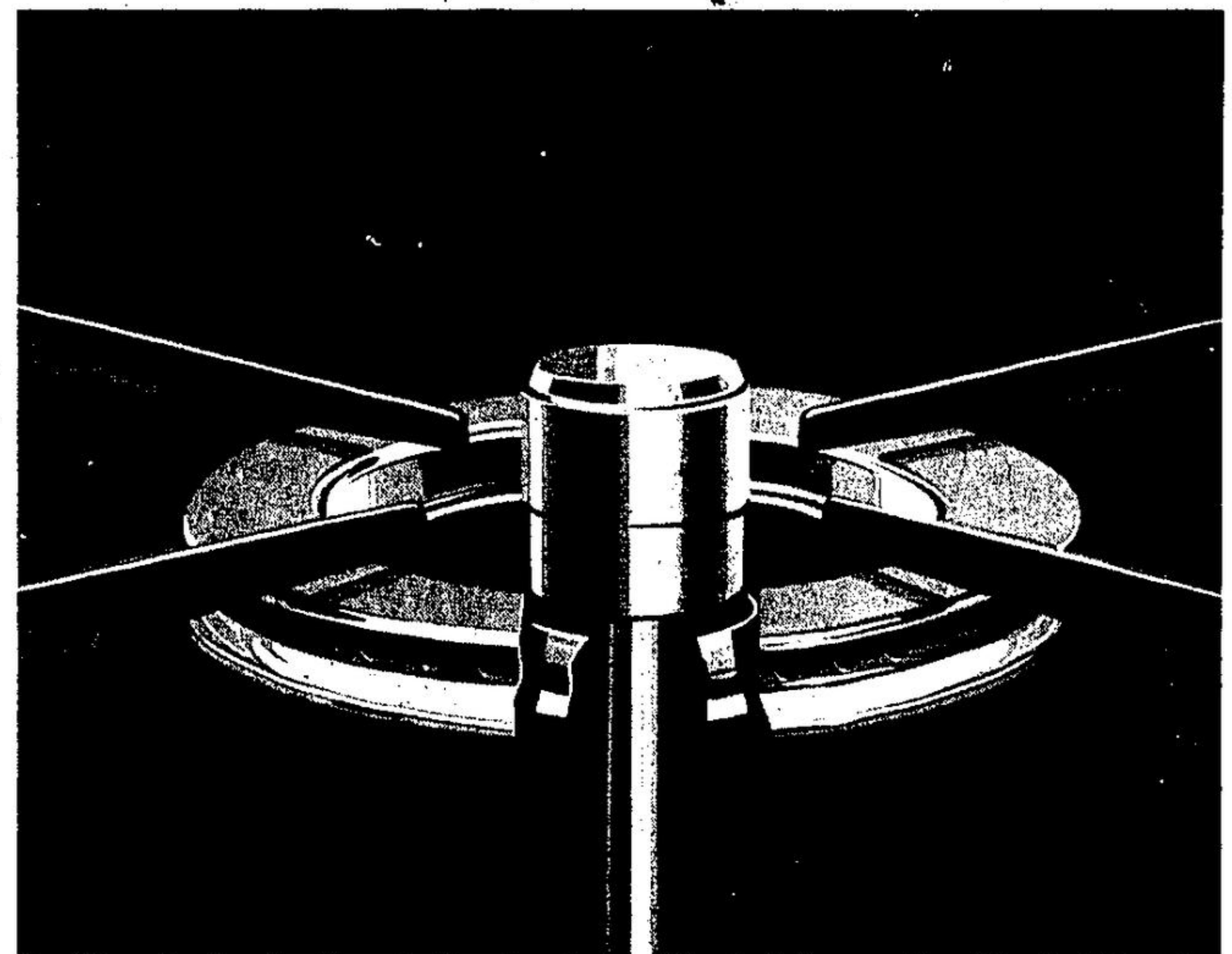
