## Ontario Outdoors

### Salmon fleet

I know, you say Salmon fishing time is coming up fast. I say it is here already. I have said and will continue to say, until it sinks in COHO can be caught in Lake Ontario now. Saturday July 26, 17 boats and about 60 people hit the lake to try and set the pattern the fish are using. These boats came in all shapes and sizes and gathered at Marie Curtis park at the mouth of Etobicoke Creek in Long Branch.

"Among them were Peter Stiklee and his new wife (would you believe married only 14 hours before??) with the "Big Jon fishing team" from Michigan. I was on the Coho Charter Boat from St. Catharines, the only outfit that you can charter for fishing Salmon in Ontario. Ron Penfound, who runs the service, invited the Garcia-Mitchell Tackle Company representative, Clay Benetue, who is something of an expert with the Garcia Graph Sonar; Williams Hills, who is the conservation editor of Fur, Fish, Game magazine; Jerry Boileau of CHCH T.V. in Hamilton, and your's truly.

The list of big name writers would take up more room than I have here, as well as CBC T.V. and 11 staff men of the Ministry of Natural Resources, who are trying to get the Salmon program in the lake to a high level of productivity.

We did not pick a good day to try this concentrated effort as the upper levels of water were too cold after the heavy winds of the day previous. Almost all of the water was reading 42 degrees Fahrenheit whereas the temperature where the Salmon range and feed is 55 degrees. In trying to locate the fish we ranged as far as 15 miles from the opposite shore and as far east as Oshawa. Others stayed within small boat range. When you hit fish there can be as many as four fish on at a time. THAT is a panic. Gord Hannah and Valdo Baders of Mississauga took the well-known Mike Bolton out and Valdo landed a nice



clean Coho estimated at seven pounds or better. Several other Coho were brought in although no Chinook Salmon were taken, but these fish may run as much as 35 pounds. The whole idea of the 17-boat fleet was to locate and chart the migratory pattern of the fish in order for everyone to get in on the prize.

If you wish to go out with the Coho Charter Service, call me, care of this paper, or at my home, and I will try to get you together with them. I think it will be worth it, as the many stories attested recently they sure can put the fish aboard. When you consider the nine-pound Salmon caught on this outing by Dick Joyce of Southampton, and the fact that they are growing FAST then this can be extremely good fishing. This time the fish were caught off the Toronto Islands but they were moving to the river mouths, especially the Credit River where they will farther about the middle of August and start their run the last week of August until the end of October.

I NEED REACTION AND YOUR COMMENTS, on the DAMS OF THE CREDIT RIVER. It has been a major topic and Al Walno, the district biologist with the MONR asked me to get people's opinions of the removal of the dams that remain as a hindrance to the upward migration of the Rainbow Trout and Salmon, along with the increasing number of Brown Trout that are appearing off the Credit. These two dams are located at Streetsville and Georgetown. IF YOU DON'T SAY NOW, you have only yourself to blame if things don't turn out the way YOU want them to in this regard.
