

# Falcons fall at home



SOCCER ACTION at Cedarvale Park Sunday afternoon, featured the Georgetown Falcons tangling with Rinascente of Toronto. The Falcons were not in top form and dropped the game 4-1.

All good things must come to an end and this past Sunday, at Cedarvale Park, the Georgetown Falcons season long, undefeated record at home went by the board as they lost 4-1 to Rinascente. For most of the game, the Falcons outplayed the visitors but just failed to capitalize on numerous scoring opportunities.

For the first 21 minutes, Rinascente played like losers and were not in the game at all. Defensive backs were criticizing the play of the forwards and vice-versa and all were getting on their goaltender's back. At that point, it appeared certain that the Falcons would come up victorious. As it so often happens in sport however, Rinascente got several breaks, jumped into a 2-0 lead and never looked back.

Rinascente lead 2-0 at halftime and the Falcons did not get on the scoreboard until

just over five minutes to full time on a well taken penalty kick by Ken Ross.

Rinascente scored at the 29-minute mark on what appeared to be an obvious offside play. The referee allowed the goal however and the visitors had a 1-0 lead. The second Rinascente goal came on a beautiful shot from 30 feet out, ten minutes later. Even then, the Falcon supporters were convinced that their team could come back.

Things became even bleaker for the hometown lads when a long ball was not cleared by Georgetown defenders and Rinascente jumped into a 3-0 lead.

It was a frustrating afternoon for the Falcons, for although they carried the play, there were many mistakes passes and not a few mistakes. Rinascente scored their final marker of the afternoon on a long ball late in the second half.

Peter Koch was undoubtedly the best Falcon on the field Sunday afternoon, he played fine soccer.

The Falcons' next game is scheduled for August 14 when they will travel to Toronto to once again do battle with Rinascente. Hopefully, the outcome will be reversed. Striker, Charlie Knoepfl, who was sitting out a game suspension, was clearly missed. The Falcon's midfielder player, Gordon Doig, out with a knee injury, should be back for the rematch against Rinascente.
