Playoff power? The Rams are showing they've got plenty

ceremoniously dumped disorganized and relying Huntsville 19-10 to gain the almost solely on individual playoffs in the Ontario Lacross Association's Central Division, couch Rob Poole predicted that he didn't think his Halton Hills Rams would lose another game on their way to the opening 20 minutes and finals, coaches are noted for going out on a limb on behalf of themselves gazing at the their stalwarts but in this case, Poole's confidence seems justified as the Rams reeled off two victories over the Orangeville Stingers to take a 2-0 stranglehold in their best three-out-of-five quartterfinal series.

The opening game of the series was played in Orangeville on Wednesday night and the Rams started out where they left off against Huntsville, faltered somewhat in the middle of the game, but finished strong to win convincingly 16-12.

Back home in Acton, before 345 partisan fans, the Rams were faced with a more determined Stinger contingent but managed to pull out a tough, 9-8 win. That makes it five wins in six outings for the Rams-three out of their ast four in regular season play and two straight in the playoffsand if it can be said that the ideal time for a team to peak is just before the playoffs, then despite the end of season gnawing of nails, the Rams timed it perfectly.

In Orangeville on Wednesday night, the Rams were hot in the early going. They took a 6-3 lead to the dressing room at the end of the first period and appeared in complete control. Where

was obvious from the start that the Stingers had changed their tactics. They played a more controlled game but the Rams were aslo playing a polsed contest and the first period ended 3-2 in the Rams favor. A brawl broke out in this opening frame that saw Rams' Kent Kentner, returning to the lineup after a suspension with a vengeance, and Wade Knight and Orangeville's Bob Noble and Rob Stewart, all sent off with Majors. The fight was more of a release valve than a portent of things to come as some bad blood had been brewing between the clubs, that the hot muggy air in the arena only heightened. Although the game saw a total of 140 minutes in penalties handed out, it was more a case of over-zealous officiating than viciousness on the player's parts which caused the

plethora of penalties. The second period was much the same as the first, with only three goals being scored as neither team wanted to break out and risk defensive lapses. It should also be noted, that both goaltenders played exceptionally well and it was their defensive acrobatics that dominated play rather than offensive efforts. The pattern remained the same in the third frame, fine goaltending at both ends of the rink, combined with controlled play on the floor and in retrospect, the Stingers' third period strategy has to be questioned. They were behind by a game in a relatively short series, would be in even more trouble if they


