Weeds cost town \$3,400

Removing noxious weeds has cost the town just over \$3,400 so far this year, but that's still not as much as was spent last year keeping public and private property in Halton Hills free from many types of weeds.

Town treasurer, Harry Henderson, told the personnel and finance committee Monday night that this year's figure is still \$600 short of the \$4,000 spent last year to control weeds. The committee approved payment of a weed control company of approximately \$3,400 to cover destroying weeds on a number of properties throughout the town.

According to the municipality's weed control bylaws, the town's weed inspector has the right to have any "noxious weeds", listed in a newspaper advertisement printed in the early summer, removed at the owner's expense. Should the owner refuse to pay the bill then the amount is then added to his tax bill.

The bylaws do not include dandelions which, according to members of the committee, appear to be one of the more "noxious weeds" to be found in Halton Hills. Councillor Harry Levy noted that public areas, such as the boulevard on Raylawn Crescent, are covered in dandelions and yet they do not necessarily have to be cut. "They're not noxious according to the laws, but they're still an annoyance to people."
