

# Royalettes clip Ho Jos

It was with a certain amount of trepidation that the Georgetown Royalettes travelled to St. Catharines last Tuesday to take on the hometown Ho Jo Cats in what was, for the Royalettes, their first venture into provincial playdowns as a Juvenile entry. The Royalettes were uncertain

as to the calibre of the team they were meeting. The only concrete knowledge they had of the Ho Jo Cats was that they had beaten Grantham to advance to the quarter-finals and therefore must have some talent.

The Royalettes on the other hand were in an enforced idle period as the team they were scheduled to meet in the first provincial round, Bramalea, had dropped out of the league just before the end of the regular season.

As it turned out however, the locals fears proved groundless as they thoroughly trounced St. Catharines 21-7 and took a one-game lead in the best two-out-of-three games series. The Royalettes started out strong and had a 7-0 lead after five and a half innings. Thinking that the game was well in hand, the coaches decided to give Laura a rest and sent her to the field. Barb Curry and Betty Marchmont were not on top of their game

and St. Catharines struck for six runs to get back into the thick of things. With one out, and the Cats still threatening, Laura was brought back to the mound and struck out the next two batters to douse the St. Kitt's rally.

The Royalettes, perhaps realizing how quickly fortunes can change, scored two runs in the seventh, three in the eighth

and then exploded for nine runs in the ninth to assure the win. Laura held St. Catharines to one run over the final three innings to continue the dominance she had shown in the early innings.

The confidence instilled by this first game win should allow the Royalettes an early series win.
