# Ontario Outdoors

## Safety pins are the thing

I admit it, I finally made a mistake. Last week I mentioned the fine levied against a land owner in the Huronia District. This person was altering the river bed of the Pine River, and I mentioned the fine as being \$3,000. In actuality the fine was \$6,548.93. So you see I did make a mistake. Sorry about that. But the fact remains that permission must be granted before any work, and I emphasize the word any, can be undertaken.

The last Saturday of September is the opening of the duck season and you had better prepare for it now. Do you have a hunting licence? They are available at your local sporting goods dealer, if you have had one previously. If not and you are under the age of 20 then you will have to take a Hunter Examination course. You can book for the courses now by contacting the ministry of natural resources for the dates and times of the course.

Better streams for more Trout, is the title of a new publication put out by the ministry and is well recommended for anyone interested in Trout fishing, or any other for that matter. The material in the booklet applies to all species of the fish. It's available from the MONR, Sports Fisheries Branch, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, Ontario M7A 1W3. The same address may be used for ordering the "Fishing Maps" listing 484 lakes that have been surveyed as to fish species, topography, etc. A list will be mailed upon request.

A little helpful hint for your tackle box: carry a few safety pins as their uses are many: holding torn clothes together, as well as broken zippers. Clip your snap swivels on to a safety pin and they will never tangle or get misplaced in your box. A large kilt pin can be obtained for some really fine uses. If they are there you will find a use for them.

This week I am including a photograph of a "Down Rigger" for those who have asked what they look like. The Down Rigger is the gear that is used to take a light line down to the pre-determined depth for trolling in deep water for Salmon and Trout. It consists of a large ball of lead weighing from 8 to 13 pounds or thereabouts. The line is fastened to this weight and is lowered into the water on



its own wire line. This puts your lure down to the fish where the strike will pull your line from the ball by way of a release clip. Then you are fighting the fish on your light outfit and not a massive wire line or lead core line. This is a very effective and efficient method of fishing for the Salmon species in the Great Lakes.  
Try it and you will never want to quit the system. Believe me. You will see these in use in the next few weeks out from Port Credit and the Humber and Credit Rivers, and the Etobicoke Creek out of Long Branch.  
The survey on the dams of the Credit Rivers is starting to roll now if you will get in there and do something, it will get straightened out that much faster.  
I will be submitting the survey that the ministry of natural resources requested, in the next two weeks. If you have an opinion, then let me hear it, in order to give them the attitude and feelings as accurately as possible. I want to enjoy without guilt feeling, our ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
