This week I am including a photograph of a "Down Rigger" for those who have asked what they look like. The Down Rigger is the gear that is used to take a light line down to the pre-determined depth for trolling in deep water for Salmon and Trout. It consists of a large ball of lead weighing from 8 to 13 pounds or there abouts. The line is fastened to this weight and is lowered into the water on



its own wire line. This puts your lure down to the fish where the strike will pill your line from the ball by way of a release clip. Then you are fighting the fish on your light outfit and not a massive wire line or lead core line. This is a very effective and efficient method of fishing for the Salmon species in the Great Lakes.

Try it and you will never want to quit the system. Believe me. You will see these in use in the next few weeks out from Port Credit and the Humber and Credit Rivers,


