Norval school forces Reed into campaign

"The right man at the right time." With that, Hugh McFarlane led the nomination for Julian Reed of Norval as Liberal candidate for the new riding of Halton-Burlington before a full house of placard waving Liberal supporters at Thursday's nomination meeting held in Milton.

With no other opposition, acclamation was declared and the long-time fighter in the Norval school issue moved on to the next round in fighting the Davis government.

"This party at this time is fighting a government which has fanned inflation by setting a pace for overspending and deficit financing to the tune of \$5.3 billion. Instead of setting an example with careful money management, it has set up costly new layers of regional government and established wasteful bureaucracy," stated Mr. McFarlane.

In his acceptance speech Mr. Reed thanked the minister of education Tom Wells, for helping him make the decision about what to do with Norval's school.

"The only resource we have is the ballot box," exclaimed Mr. Reed. "And that is why I'm doing what I am doing."

Liberal headquarters for the area have, ironically, been set up in the Norval school.

Can the Davis government carry this province into the future? was the question posed by Murray Gaunt Liberal MPP for the northerly Bruce riding.

"The Davis government is the cause of inflation," explained Mr. Gaunt. "There is no reason for a debt of \$5.3 billion in prosperous times."

According to the Liberals, the debt of

Ontario has exceeded the national debt each year the Davis government has been in power.

"It takes \$1.9 million just to pay the interest per day for the debts of the Davis government."

The second issue, regional government, was covered by the Liberal MPP as one of the biggest financial burdens to taxpayers yet, with costs up as high as 70 percent for some of the areas now under the regional system.

Ontario Hydro and the proposed power corridor through Halton will become the subject for an independent study into the need and feasibility of the proposed route of the 500kV power transmission line, if the Liberals succeed.

"Ontario Hydro has applied for a rate increase of 25 percent each year for the next two years," explained Mr. Gaunt. "Our government will be more sensitive to the needs of the people in consideration of these matters."

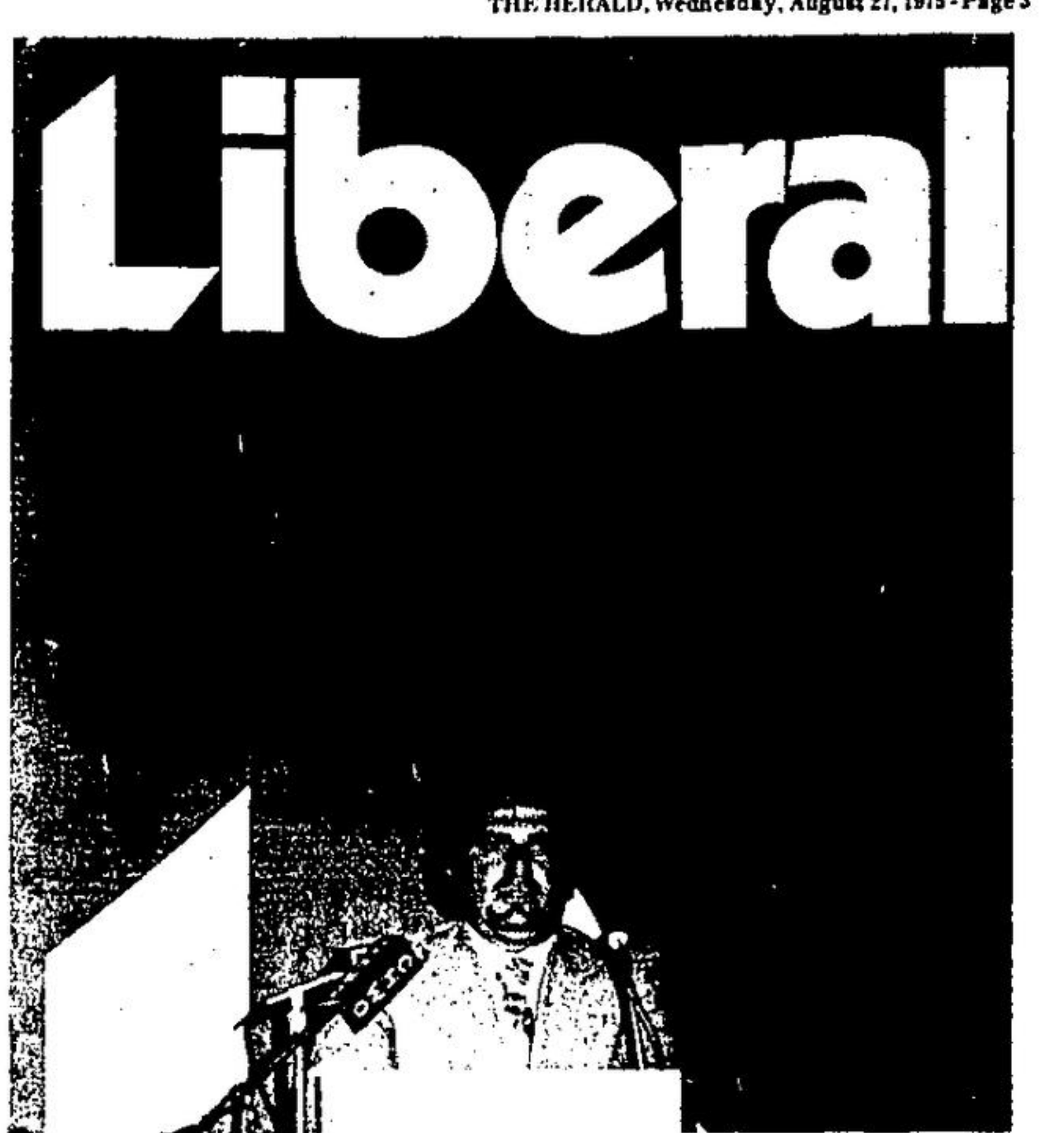
Further Liberal elective policies include the disclosure of details of all government contracts, tenders, and Ontario Housing land appropriations in addition to curbing public relations spending by 50 percent.

"Can we afford a Davis government?" was the closing question.

In his brief speech Mr. Reed indicated that he "really cares", about many things affecting the Ontario economy: the \$5.3 billion debt, the Norval school, the regional system, and basic education.

"We will experience the fresh air of public scrutiny again," furthered Mr. Reed. "We will be free to determine our destiny."

"The fight will continue where it all started, Norval school."
