The playoffs in the Halton County Ladies Softball League have reached the final round, and although they have been marred somewhat by the withdrawal of Streetsville, which gave Georgetown a bye into the final series, the semifinals, which pitted league champion Hillsburgh against Glen Williams, provided all the excitement usually accredited to post-season play.

The Glen Williams team finished in fourth spot, six points behind Hillsburgh and the general consensus of opinion was that they would not provide too much competition for the league champions. As is so often the case, however, once playoffs get underway, anything can happen and most enlightened teams regard them as a brand new season.

The Glen gave ample support to this theory as they took the opening game from Hillsburgh 5-2. Unfortunately

Downpour dampens Georgetown win

The Halton Ladies Softball League finals between the Georgetown Georgettes and defending champion Hillsburgh opened on Monday night in Georgetown and the game could almost be split into two separate contests.

With lightning sparking in the distance and a heavy wetness in the air, quite a few people wondered if the game would even get underway. It did get underway, but the rain did come, halting the game after five full innings, with the Georgettes out in front of Hillsburgh, 5-4.

The rain which had poured down, gave way to a slight drizzle after about 15 minutes

and the game was recommenced. This was the second game and, before it was over, Hillsburgh had picked up 12 runs in two innings to take the opening game of the finals, 16-5. The Georgettes no doubt now wish that the downpour had continued unabated.

Hillsburgh opened strongly, by scoring three runs in the opening frame but the Georgettes made it obvious that they were there to play also as they notched two runs in the bottom of the first, to trail 3-2. Hillsburgh picked up their fourth run in the third inning, but the Georgettes tied the game in the fourth frame

as the rain started to fall. The game had to go at least five full innings before it could be declared an official contest, and as the Georgettes had picked up a single run in the fifth to lead, 5-4, it appeared that the win was theirs.

It was just not in the wind however and when the teams took to the field after the slight delay, Hillsburgh took command. Three Hillsburgh hits, two Georgette errors and two walks produced three Hillsburgh runs in the sixth inning and five Hillsburgh hits, combined with three Georgette errors in the seventh inning supplied Hillsburgh with seven more

runs and the 16-5 win. The rain certainly dampened the Georgettes spirits, as they failed to score a run in their last two at bats.

Rhonda Carney picked up the win for Hillsburgh with Ev Metter taking the loss for the Georgettes. Mary Bullocks was once again tops at the plate for Hillsburgh as she hit three-for-four and drove in two runs, while scoring three. The top Georgette batter was Sue Fredette who went two-for-four, batted in a run and scored a run.

The second game of the finals will be played in Hillsburgh on Wednesday night.

The Georgetown Merchants, of the Halton County Men's Fastball Association, locked up a playoff berth by downing Mississauga, 6-0 on Friday night and now must wait for the regular season's postponed games to be played before they will know who they meet in the first round of league playoffs.

Glen Williams, although idle this past week are also assured of a playoff spot but, although they currently hold down fourth place, could drop a notch as the regular schedule is played out. Any ties in the final league standings will be decided by a one-game playoff, with a coin flip to determine who gets the home field advantage.

The playoffs are slated to start by September 2, with the

following pairings: first vs sixth, second vs fifth and the third place finisher tangling with the fourth place finisher. These first game series are the best two-out-of-three games.

Second round play will have the winner of the first round who finished highest in the standings, gaining a bye, while the other two winners will meet in, again, a best two-out-of-three series. In this semi-final, a flip of the coin will once more decide which team gets the home field advantage.

The finals will be a best three-out-of-five games series. Streetsville, Lowville, Palermo and Malton all have single games to play, however as their outcome will not affect the league standings, they have been washed out.
