Falcons win one, lose one

Georgetown Falcons played Neerlandia last Thursday at St. Clair. Behind at halftime, 1-0, the Georgetown side exploded for seven goals within the last 45 min.
 Robert Lister tied the game on a pass from Stuart Robbins

at the ten minute mark of the second-half. Robert Lister played a fine game for the Falcons, setting up Ken Ross at the nine minute mark to go ahead 2-1.
 Mike Deer, Falcon's goalkeeper tackled a

Neerlandia forward coming in on him for which the referee awarded Neerlandia a penalty shot. Mike, with a good display of net-minding, stopped this well taken shot. Neerlandia however did tie up the game 2-2 at the 18-minute mark from a

corner kick. This was all for Neerlandia.
 Robert Lister passed a well placed ball to Joe Cairns who scored at the 21-minute mark. The same two players teamed up three minutes later, with Joe Cairns scoring his second goal of the night. Robert Lister, who figured in four goals so far, broke through himself to score his second of the night. Ian Syme scored the last two goals, the first coming on a header from a Gary Miller pass, the second on his own rebound.

Neerlandia came back with a one goal near the end of the game but the Falcons completely dominated the second half.
 It was a good win for Georgetown, but three days later they gave up one goal in the first and two in the second to lose to Oakville 3-0. The Falcons were without four regulars but played remarkably well hitting the post twice and pressing in Oakville territory for the first ten minutes. Then Oakville scored, demoralizing the team to a standstill.
 Mike Peeters was clearly held by an Oakville player, preventing him to meet the ball carrier who came in alone on Mike Deere and scored. The referee allowed the goal and Georgetown never recovered, feeling throughout the game that they had to play Oakville and referee both. This loss prevented Georgetown from moving into second place.
 Wednesday, the Falcons will play Hispano, a Spanish side at St. Clair. But the big test will come Wednesday, Sept. 3, in Victoria Park against Chinguacousy Majors.
 Haddy Smedema says he will move up some Jr. "B" players for trial games, not being satisfied with the failure to show of some regulars. Captain Bill Xanthopoulos was injured last week, playing a regular game in Oakville despite a bad foot injury. He felt he could not let his team down, but voiced his displeasure over the absence of others.
