

Ontario Outdoors 30,000 lbs of fish?

I know, it seems that every week I mention something about the Coho Salmon. The thing is, everyone wants to hear about them. They are about a half-mile to a mile off the mouth of the Humber and Credit Rivers at this time, and some of them are even in the rivers already. On a calm day you can go out in a small boat, but be sure of your safety equipment. Check with regulations so as not to get towed in by the coast guard.

Check the temperature of the water as this is of prime importance in the success of this fishery. Keep in mind some of the things I have told you in the past and, if you want someone to go with you, call me!

The Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources made two seizures of illegal Walleye from the Kingsville dock recently. These were on two different occasions, showing that the fines and seizures did not stop illegal fishing for a moment. The first was ten thousand pounds and the second was thirty thousand pounds. Just stop and think about that for a moment. When was the last time you caught twenty pounds of fish??

For you fishermen who fish for the sport of it, (not Guincho weight) here is a place to go: Paudash Lake. This is in the Madawaska Valley south of Faraday on Hwy. 23. This lake has a good population of Bass, Walleye and Lake Trout, and the Madawaska River rapids are near enough that you can try them in the same day.

These rapids are above Matawastchan and there, also, a man (or woman) can take Large Mouth and Small Mouth Blackbass along with Walleye and Pike.

The hunting seasons are now listed and a copy of the regulations can be obtained from your favourite sporting goods store. I won't go into the listing as it is so long, but grouse opens Sept. 27 in this area. Take note that now there is a listing for "Primitive Weapons" meaning muzzle loaders and bows.

In case you were wondering, the ministry implemented the changes I suggested to them for the printing of the regulations to make them more easily understood. It can be done, if you have any suggestions they are more than happy to take a look at them.
