



Halton Hills swimmers third in regional meet

Last Tuesday at the Acton Indoor Pool, approximately 350 young swimmers took part in the sixth annual Regional Swim Meet. The meet, attracted eight teams from Halton Hills (composed of swimmers from Georgetown and Acton), Milton, Hamilton, Caledonia, Ancaster, Hamilton Mountain Sharks, Mississauga and Fairfield. It was run under the supervision of Nick Carter, a field representative of Ontario Aquatics, a division of Ontario Sport.

The day-long program was composed of 54 events, with age ranges in both the boys and girls categories running from eight years and under to 15 years and over. All trophies were donated by the Royal Bank and the Canadian Olympic Association. The acquisition of indoor pools in Georgetown and Acton has raised the calibre of local competitive swimming tremendously. Unfortunately for the region's swim teams, Fairfield appears just as strong as ever. In the six years that the meets have been held, Fairfield has walked off with the championship silverware five times. Hamilton managed to break the victory string in 1973.

Mark Bray also had a fourth place finish in the boys nine-and-ten-year-old 25 metre backstroke. In the nine and ten-year-old girls category in this event, Sue Maason swam to a third place finish.

In the boys 13-and-14-year-old 50 metre backstroke, Desmond Rafferty placed fifth. David Payton garnered a fourth place finish in the boys nine-and-ten-year-old 25 metre

breastroke. In the 25 metre fly for 11-and-12-year-olds, two young lads and two young girls from Halton Hills made a valiant showing. In the boys category, Eric Elston came in fourth, while Paul Smith placed sixth. The Glen Bantams met Caledonia in the final game of the best-of-three series last Wednesday at the Glen

Williams ball park but got no closer than within six runs of the title and bowed out, 9-3.
