What kind of neighbors do you have? There are so many kinds. We are most fortunate where we live, we have excellent neighbors. How about you?

Have you the sort who say, "I keep myself to myself?" They do not mix or engage in the life of the community, but live selfish and secluded lives. They value their privacy, and of course one respects that.

Or, is yours always popping in and out, perhaps never even bothering to knock? It can be awkward sometimes! Do you have neighbors who are always borrowing a cup of sugar, a few tea bags and forget to pay back?

Perhaps you have one who is always complaining. The children make too much noise, or your weeds protrude through the fence. Or, are you on the receiving end, and have noisy ones who use radio and television as a public address system, and keep all the windows open for good measure? And are there bangs, shouts and slamming of doors at all hours of the night?

My concern is for those who live alone, especially elderly, housebound and infirm. Should anything need fixing or a toy need mending, pop it over to Joseph, he will put it right. Mary, so kind and motherly, practical and never flustered. The children well behaved but probably very noisy at times, for I am sure there would be a great deal of laughter and gaiety in that house. A constant stream of people would always be popping in for a chat or help. If you were in trouble where you would know where to go.

"Behold I stand at the door and knock!" Jesus must have knocked on many doors. He would always be welcome. "It's Jesus—do come in!" People would be better for His coming; they still are. A lonely ostracized man, Zaccheus, hears Jesus inviting him for a meal, and a chat. It was an unforgettable occasion, and Zaccheus becomes a different man.

In his Poem "Tears and Scruples" Browning writes about the God who draws near to us in our friends. "Hush now I pray thee—what if that friend happen to be God?"

When did you last visit your neighbor? Or are you feeling lonely and forgotten? Listen! There is Someone at your door!

Town building passes \$11 million mark in August

Total value of all construction in Halton Hills thus far in 1975 has surpassed the \$11 million mark. To the end of August the total amount of construction either underway completed or immediately planned for was \$11,355,807.95, according to the town's building department's monthly report, issued last week.

August witnessed a bumper crop of swimming pools in Halton Hills. The report notes that 20 construction permits for swimming pools were issued during the 31 days of last month. Total value of the 20 pools amounted to \$80,855. That brings the total number of pools added to Halton Hills' backyards this year to 127, valued at \$472,472.95.

Permits for seven single family dwellings being built under plans of subdivisions were granted during the past month. Total value of the seven new homes is \$210,000. Five other single family

Time to register for Guides and Brownies

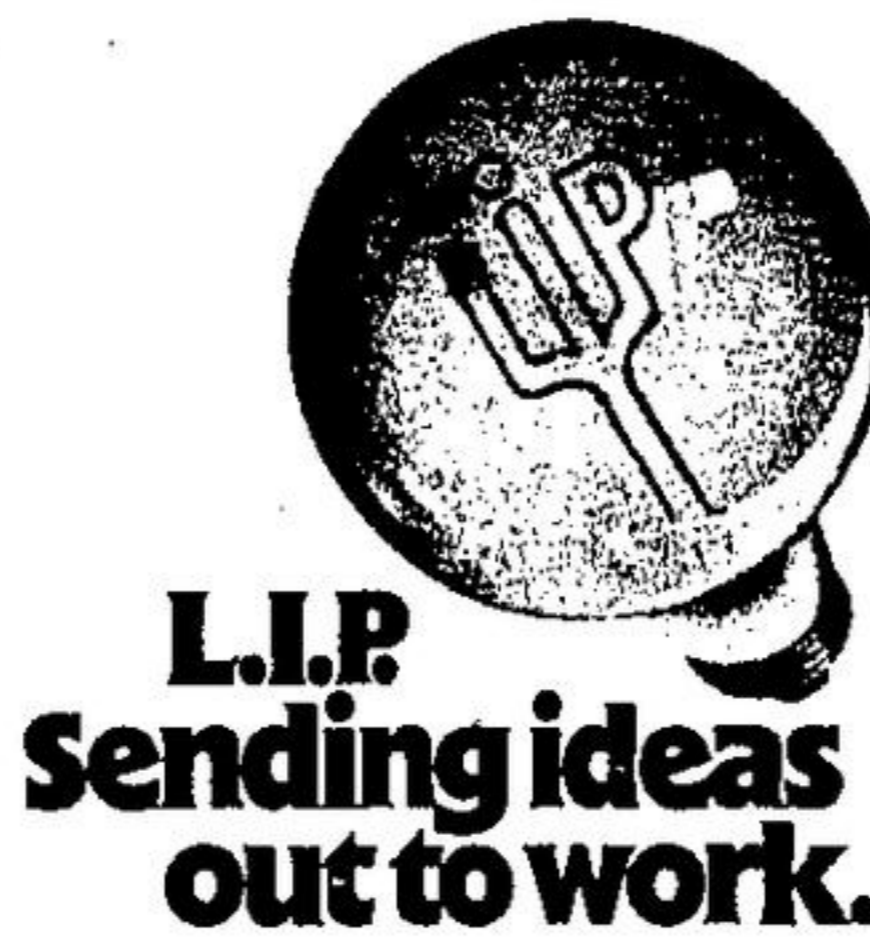

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Maltby attends his first council meeting

George Maltby was present in the town's council chambers last Tuesday evening to hear the three readings of a bylaw officially appointing him to Halton Hills town council.

While the bylaws were unanimously endorsed by the council members, Councillor Maltby will not be able to take over the seat left vacant upon the recent death of Len Cox until the newest member representing Ward 2 has been sworn in.

That was expected to take place in time for Councillor Maltby to attend the works committee meeting Monday night.

The three readings of a bylaw appointing Councillor Dick Howitt one of the town's five representatives on regional council was also approved Tuesday. Councillor Ric Morrow had a few words of warning to his new fellow regional councillor.

"When it comes to voting

between the south and the north site for the new regional headquarters, vote for the north!"

Councillor Morrow has been much criticized for his stand in favor of a site in Oakville for the region's new headquarters. The other regional councillors from Halton Hills have been in favor of a site at the intersection of Derry Road and Highway 25 near Milton.

Ewe killed

An ewe owned by George F. Clements was killed recently by a dog or dogs and the town is going to pay for the loss of the sheep. Council last Tuesday night approved the payment of \$50 to Mr. Clements.

The loss of the sheep was verified by the town's livestock valuator, Spencer Wilson.
