

Total value of all construction in Halton Hills thus far in 1975 has surpa: 1 the \$11 million mark. To the end of August the total amount of construction either underway completed or immediately planned for was \$11,355,807.95, according to the town's building department's mon-Lome to Lhurch thly report, issued last week.

August witnessed a bumper erop of swimming pools in Halton Hills. The report notes that 20 construction permits for swimming pools were issued during the 31 days of last month. Total value of the 20 pools amounted to \$80,855. That brings the total number of pools added to Halton Hills' backyards this year to 127,


